Witnesses of Athy, William Lennon was fraudulently obtaining 15*l.* from Lieutenant-governor, at Naas, on the 6th of May since that he was Captain Brown of the 1st regt. which, he said, was quartered in the town and was in pursuit of a deserter from it:

They expect to be joined by Denmark and Britain; probably by Russia.

In the mean time, the French armies are pouring into Germany in every direction; and are particularly concentrating their forces on the frontiers of Saxony and Austria. Bonaparte has expressed his determination, should any resistance be shewn, to compel the Northern Princes to approve of the new political changes, by force of arms; and their non-acquiescence will be the signal for renewed hostilities.

The intentions of Prussia were first surmised by a partial change which has taken place in the cabinet of Berlin. Haugwitz has for some time been losing his influence with his Sovereign; and about the 4th instant one of his most strenuous supporters, Count Schullenberg Kehnert, the Prussian Civil and Military Governor of Hanover resigned his office. His resignation was not only accepted, but Generish, a friend of Baron Hardenberg, replaces him in the military department and another friend of the Baron enjoys the civil administration *ad interim*.

This sudden change in the conduct of the King of Prussia, is attributed to the disappointment of certain views of aggrandisement and preponderance which he lately entertained; Bonaparte having deprived him, contrary to an express promise, of certain parts of the Electorate of Hanover, particularly Bentheim, Osnabruck, &c. It is a fact, that an army of 45,000 men is now ready to take the field, near Munich in Westphalia, and it is daily receiving reinforcements. The Elector of Saxony has also ordered a part of his army to march to the frontiers, and Hesse Cassel and Brunswick are making the most active preparations for war.

In the Electorate of Brandenburg, the people are so afraid of a visit from the French, that the merchants of Magdeburg, on the 6th instant countermanded a quantity of goods that were to be sent from Hamburg up the Elbe, for fear of their falling into the hands of the enemy.

On the 8th inst. it was reported at Hamburg, that the French troops had passed the frontiers of Saxony, and entered Cobourg!—From another quarter, the Prussian army advances to Embden and the bank of the Ems, while the French troops in Holland, by forced marches, take the same route.

The French Ministers in different parts of Germany have ordered the treaties and conventions with France and the Kings of Bavaria, Wirtemberg, and other Princes, to be inserted in every journal on the Continent, particularly in the *Hamburg Correspondent*, or Official Gazette, in which it appeared on the 8th instant.

The Imperial City of Nuremberg is to be ceded to Bavaria; so that only Hamburg, Lubeck; and Bremen, still preserve their precarious existence.
