Yesterday morning the Right Rev. Lord Bishop of Limerick, and the Marquis of Tavistock, son to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, arrived at Swinburne's hotel, from the Lake of Killarney, and immediately after the Marquis set off for Dublin.

Last Monday night, an alarming fire broke out in a thatched house at Thomond-gate, the property of Mr. Mark Daly, which would have destroyed the adjoining houses, were it not for the precaution used in stripping off the thatched roofs. We are happy to state that no injury, except the burning of the house occurred.

The County Limerick Royal Regiment, under the command of the Right Hon. Lord Muskerry, marched on Wednesday and Thursday last, from Armagh, for Newry, where they are to be quartered the ensuing year.

The Britannia, Scout, and the Janet, Banatyne, from this port, arrived at Clysse the 24th ult.

As there is nothing too high or too low, too general or too minute, for the comprehensive genius of the Emperor of the French, we learn without surprise, that he has compiled a Catechism for the use of all the Churches in his Empire. Even the Synod of the Jews now sitting at Paris, will most likely be compelled to adopt it.

Mr. O'Brien, the celebrated political writer, is appointed Marshal of the Vice Admiralty Court at the Cape of Good Hope. The office is said to be of considerable emolument; and not the least good part of the situation is, that it can be done by Deputy.

The Earl of Arran, Lady Donally, Hon. Mrs. Whaley, Col. Vincent, Col. Rerdon, and lady, Mr. Kelly and lady, Mr. Wolfe and family, two Messrs. Tolers, Nugent, French, Palmer, Oswald, Hardy, Evans, and Crauford, &c. are arrived in Dublin from England.

The Royal City of Dublin Regiment of Militia, commanded by Colonel Sankey, marched into Armagh from Newry, a few days ago, in order to relieve the Limerick Regiment, who have got the route.

On Saturday last a number of prisoners, under the escort of a strong military guard, arrived in Dublin from Tullamore. They are brought for trial by a court martial, the proceedings of which are begun.
