TO HIS EXCELLENCY
 JOHN DUKE OF BEDFORD,

Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland.

With every deference to your Excellency, as the repre-
 sentative of Majesty, as well as the respect due to your high
 rank, as the Head of the illustrious House of Russel, to
 which you are so bright an ornament, permit me to address
 your Excellency on behalf of the Poor Peasantry of Ireland,
 over which your Excellency is appointed to govern.

Amongst the many Chief Governors placed over this coun-
 try (some of whom have resorted to coercion, others to
 conciliation, grievous calamities attending the one, and benefi-
 cial effects attending the other), I may safely affirm that
 your Excellency has reached the Irish shores with more than
 common advantages; and the Irish people hailed your arri-
 val amongst them as the arrival of a guardian angel, sent by
 a protecting Providence; to remedy the many grievances
 which, unfortunately, this nation has always to complain of.

Divided amongst themselves, it is one of the many benefi-
 ts of the Constitution that, in a state of dissatisfaction and
 discontent, the arrival of a Chief Governor intent on doing
 them services, and healing their grievances, has always been
 attended with some degree of success.—May it not be rea-
 sonably presumed, that your Excellency's Administration
 will be such as to impress on the minds of the poorest of his
 Majesty's subjects in this part of the Empire, that their griev-
 ances, when well-founded, have been remedied, and every
 attention paid to the amelioration of their condition, as a just
 reward for their loyalty and attachment to the Person and
 Government of our illustrious Sovereign.

If your Excellency made a tour through this country,
 which it is to be hoped you will before your departure to
 your native land, it would, no doubt, be too evident to
 your Excellency, that the wretched peasant, in his miserable
 hut (contrived with less comfort for shelter and convenience,
 than amongst savage tribes in the extreme parts of the earth,)
 must draw on an unhappy existence. Nature lavish in her
 gifts around them, the Country and Climate blessed by Pro-
 vidence, yet, alas! with all these advantages, obliged to
 pine in penury, without any possible hope of bettering his
 situation! scanty his means of subsistence—the price of his
 labour most moderate—his riches, if I can call it by that
 name, rarely extending to a four-footed beast—his food the
 Potatoe, *his only food* where Providence has not blessed him
 with a cow—his tillage oats, flax, and potatoes, perhaps in
 the whole not amounting to half an acre of land—his look-
