

and its success has fully established the accuracy of his information, as well as the soundness of his judgment. The liberal conduct of the captors, and the well-timed and humane proclamations published by General Beresford, may be expected to produce the happiest effect on the population of that rich province, and to establish the British authority, not only without fears, but in the hearts, of the inhabitants.

The following Article we extract from the London Star of the 18th instant, arrived at our Office last night:

We have never been very sanguine in our expectations of Peace from the present negotiation; the public will therefore believe that we would not now state a contrary opinion, but on what we reckon the very best authority. We understand that many of the difficulties that stood in the way have now been happily removed, the French Government having lowered much in its tone since the rejection of the Russian Treaty, and shewn a disposition to treat on terms not degrading to those from whom they seek a Peace.—We believe we are warranted in stating, that a peace, and a good peace too, is now confidently expected by his Majesty's Ministers. Some days ago Lord Lauderdale gave a grand dinner to the French Cabinet Ministers. At the meeting there was more than usual cordiality, and the general feeling was, that the hostility of the two nations would soon be terminated.

We believe that it is intended to restore Buenos Ayres to the King of Spain, on the condition of this country enjoying a free trade with that quarter.

His Majesty's gun brig, *Virago*, arrived in the Shannon the 19th inst. to relieve the *Resolute* on this station; the *Resolute* sailed for Cork, on arrival of the *Virago*.

A most melancholy accident happened on Thursday last, at Killorglin, co. Kerry. A mad Dog, ran into the house of a Farmer in that neighbourhood, and bit his wife four children, the servant maid, and afterwards twenty cows on the farm. The apprehension and horror of this unfortunate family can better be conceived than expressed.

A few days ago, the 26th, 28th, 30th, 42d, 47th, 48th, 53d, 66th, and 92d light companies of the second battalions, which compose the Galway garrison, received the route for their respective regiments, doing duty in different parts of this kingdom—the first division marched on Tuesday, and were to be followed by the second on Wednesday.

On Wednesday last, while three masons were employed in dashing the outside of a mill belonging to Mr. Jones, Kilnacarrack, in the county Wicklow, the scaffolding gave way, and two of them were precipitated from the attic story, one of whom, named Dunn, received such direful injuries that he expired immediately after his fall; the other had his legs, arms, and several of his ribs fractured, notwithstanding which, at the time our account was received, hopes were entertained of his surviving this mangled, contused, and miserable condition. The third person, brother to the man killed, on the vacillation of the scaffold, by an instantaneous effort, in which he forced his hands through the glass of one of the upper windows, sustained himself till he obtained assistance from people within the building, who kept him suspended for some time, and by breaking up the sash, were so lucky as to effect, with some difficulty, his deliverance from a most affrighting state of danger.
