We are sorry to hear that Lord Blaney's Regiment, the 89th, still continues afflicted with the ophthalmia, at Portsmouth.

Both these very able Cavalry officers, Lords Annet and Rosslyn, it is said will soon be employed in active service.

The whole of the German Legion, Artillery, Cavalry, and Infantry, is about to leave our hands on service.

BUENOS AYRES.

It was so currently reported yesterday, that an cargo had been laid on the vessels clearing out the river for Buenos Ayres, that we could hardly doubt its truth. We are happy, however, in being now able to state that there was no ground whatever for the report.

We understand also that this conquest is believed to be in perfect security, two regiments having been sent from the Cape of Good Hope on the 18th of August, as a reinforcement to Gen. Rosford.

A despatch from the Governor General and Council, dated the 1st of May, 1806, was received on Tuesday last at the East India House, from which the following is an extract:—"No circumstances have occurred; or, in our judgement, are likely to occur, in any part of India, of a nature to disturb the tranquility of our possessions, or to impede the accomplishment of the arrangements which are in progress for the reduction of our expediture, and the consequent complete relief of public finances."

Letters have been received from the Cape, by late arrivals, which state, that an additional force of 1000 men had sailed from that colony for Buenos Ayres, for the purpose of proceeding against Monte Video; which fortress was understood, would surrender on the first summons.

By accounts from Honduras, received by way of Boston, it appears that settlement is under great apprehensions of an attack from the Spaniards.

The firing that was heard off Boulogne, is now understood to have been a *feu-de-joie* by the garrison in consequence of the late success.

An account has been received of the death of Wm. Ryves, Esq. Lieutenant in the 58th regt. eldest son of Edward Ryves, esq. of this city; a young gentleman who was highly esteemed by his brother officers and those who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. His death was in consequence of a fever brought on by fatigue in the engagement last August in Calabria.

A few days ago, the Tipperary mail, with the Waterford Clonmell, and Cashel letters, &c. for this City, was robbed between Clonmell and Cashel.

It is with much concern we have to state the sudden death, at Rathkeal, on Sunday evening, of Miss Tuohy, daughter of the late David Tuohy, Esq. of Tralee—she was a young lady of most engaging manners, and is sincerely regretted by a numerous and respectable connexion.

It is reported that a dreadful fracas has taken place at Fermoy, between a party of the 25th regiment and some of the Hanoverian Troops, in consequence of a dispute at some trifling dance at a common *Jig-house*, but we hear it has turned out more of the tragic than comic entertainment, as it is said two or three have been killed, and a greater number wounded. The Hanoverians were marched off to Mallow.—C. E. P.
