

been enabled to resume an advanced position, on the heights of Monteleone.

“ Previous to the evacuation of Calabria Ulteriore by the combined British and Sicilian troops, Sir John Stuart made a tour through the country, accompanied by a small detachment of the 20th Light Dragoons from St. Euphemia, by Squillace to Reggio, visiting the different towns and villages, assembling the Municipal Powers, and urging them to enjoin system, subordination, and humanity, in the various movements of the masse, while acting against the enemy—at the same time to impress upon the minds of the people in general, that a relaxation in their opposition to the enemy, might tend to the entire subjugation of the Calabrese,

“ The position of the army in the vicinity of Messina is better adapted to renew offensive operations against the enemy, than any local advantages that could be taken in Calabria Ulteriore—as in the latter case they might be apprised of our intentions, but now, we must derive considerable benefit from the secrecy of our proposed attacks.

“ The French united forces, consisting of 12,000 men, are said to be again under the command of the defeated General Regnier, but we have intelligence that Massena had paid them a visit at his head quarters at Monteleone. As yet they have shewn no inclination to advance beyond that position, fearful of a similar lesson being taught them to that on the Plains of Maida.

“ They are not desirous of a further proof of the prowess of Britons, and while they are within a day's march of those Plains their retreat is secure. The sailing of a few transports thro' the Straits of Faro, causes perpetual disquiet throughout the enemy's lines.

“ Being in possession of the Castle of Scylla, which has lately been put in an excellent state of defence, we render perfect the security of the Straits of Faro, and the opposite shores.

“ The consequences of the battle of Maida have not only diminished the forces of the enemy in Calabria, but it has likewise tended to increase our own, as 1500 Swiss and Poles, remarkably fine men, have volunteered to serve in our foreign corps, and between four and five hundred more were daily expected to follow their example.

“ Sir John Stuart was at Malta on the 15th ult. on his way home, waiting the departure of the Mediterranean convoy.—He was in good health and spirits, although he had not then learnt of the honours conferred on him by his most gracious Sovereign.

“ The Expedition under the command of General Paget, which sailed from Plymouth, passed the Straits of Gibraltar, on the 1st of November, all well.

“ The French and Spanish ships in the harbour of Cadiz, have moved further up, so that we do not now expect them to come out. They were before in a position close to the mouth of Cadiz harbour, ready for a start. Lord Collingwood is as vigilant and persevering as he is brave, twelve months has his ship been at sea, without having once, by any accident, dropt anchor! We are all in high health and spirit.”

Loss of the Glasgow Packet.

The following are the particulars respecting the loss of this vessel:—

The Glasgow Packet, Moses Johnston master, sailed from Leith on Sunday the 16th instant, at five o'clock in the evening, with twenty-one passengers on board. At two o'clock next morning she struck upon a sunk rock outside the Fearn

Ballymore, Galway, Headford, Roscommon, Tuam, and Westport.

Wednesday last, a melancholy accident happened at Passage, near Waterford:—As five sailors belonging to a West Indiaman, (on her way to Cork to join convoy,) were in the act of weighing anchor, the boat upset, and, we are sorry to state, that three of them went to the bottom, and never after rose:—the other two were providentially saved.
