

acquainting you, for the information of the Merchants concerned in the Trade with America, that the Treaty of Amity, Navigation and Commerce, between his Majesty and the United States, was yesterday signed by the Commissioners, respectively appointed for that purpose by both Governments. The treaty will be immediately transmitted to America; but until the ratifications on both sides shall be exchanged, it cannot be made public."

It is with the greatest concern we announce the death, on the 31st of October last, of Brigadier General Crofton Vandeleur, of Kilrush, county Clare. To his family, friends, and his countrymen, who are in the army, he is an irreparable loss. We give the following account from the Antigua Gazette:

"On Friday morning last, died, in the 36th year of his age, after a short illness, Brigadier-General Crofton Vandeleur, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's troops in this island, and Colonel of the 46th regiment of Foot. Perhaps the death of few men are more to be regretted than this gentleman: his character, considered in every point of view, demands respect and admiration. His manners were plain, uncontaminated with French grimace, and indicative of the sincerity of his heart. The testimony of those who enjoyed his friendship and intimacy, forms the most honorable attestation to his social virtues; but, perhaps, the tender and strong attachment with which he loved his young, amiable, and affectionate spouse, whom he has now left in an advanced state of pregnancy to deplore his premature loss, will, more powerfully claim our esteem than any other part of his character. With respect to his public services, they have been invariably marked with ardent and indefatigable zeal for the benefit of his country. Every eye in this island witnessed the prompt activity, the firm resolution with which he advanced to repel the danger which seemed to threaten us. The remembrance of this will live in our breasts; and cannot fail to excite therein, a lively gratitude to the man who was forward to sacrifice his life for our protection.—We understand, that it was intended, at the expiration of the General's command here, to present him with some token of the high sense entertained by the Legislature of his merits. We cannot refrain from saying, that we regret the first opportunity of doing so was neglected, and that it is now too late. The remains of General Vandeleur were deposited in the Church Yard at Falmouth, on Saturday noon, minute guns firing at Shirley Heights during the whole of the ceremony."

After Sermon on Sunday last at George's Church, a collection was made for the relief of 20 poor families, living in great wretchedness in the Crescent vaults at Newtown Pery; the poor men living in them are all labourers, and reduced to great poverty by the continual wetness of the season. We have the pleasure to hear that near 20*l.* was collected for them, and that seasonable relief has been thus afforded, through the bounty of the congregation at Church on that day. The numbers in family amount to above 90, and it is expected, that, when the charitable aid of those who had not money about them on the occasion, but who promised to send, shall be added, the wants of these poor people will be relieved till spring, when, if it hoped, they will be able to support themselves by labour. The money is given by so much a week, according to the wants of the people, and bedsteads supplied, which were greatly wanted. Benefactions will be received by the Rev. Chancellor Heare.
