of water. We are sorry to state that the first
Mate, in endeavouring to swim ashore with a
line to make it fast to a boat (both of the ship's
boats having been previously carried away) for
the purpose of saving those who remained on
board, on approaching the land, was, by the
violence of the surf, dashed against a rock and
so severely hurt, as to sink immediately; and
notwithstanding he was quickly picked up by
some men from the shore, who meritoriously risked
their own lives in hopes to save his, and every
possible care and attention paid he died short-
ly after. The vessel, it is thought, will not be
got off.

"Same day, and about the same hour, the
brig Elizabeth, of this port, Captain King, bound
to Limerick with staves, was also driven ashore
at Quinley's Point; but she will be got off, when
lightened, with very little injury.

"Two lighters, laden with merchandise, on
their way to Strabane, were sunk at the bridge,
and a great part of their property lost. The men
were provisionally saved."

The following Circular has been transmitted to
the Commandants of Yeomanry Corps in the
Limerick District:

Limerick, Jan. 5, 1807.

"Sir,—His Grace the Lord Lieutenant has
thought proper to command that a minute in-
spection be made of the several Yeomanry Corps
of the city and county of Limerick, their arms
and accoutrements; and not only of the arms
and accoutrements produced on the parade of
each corps, but such as may be lodged in their
stores, or in the quarters of the Commandants of
Corps, and reports to be made of the actual state
according to a form prepared.

"The object of this Order is to ascertain, by
actual inspection, the state and number of the
arms belonging to each corps.

"With a view to render this Inspection as com-
plete and satisfactory as may be, it is advisable
that it should not only be general, but be made
on the same day; and as this would render the
attendance of Brigade-Major Harding, impossi-
ble, I am authorised to appoint proper officers,
of sufficient rank for the purpose, who will at-
tend at the usual hour and place appointed for
the several parades.

"His Grace the Lord Lieutenant has thought fit
to entrust this arrangement to my care; and, being
well apprised of his Grace's wish to consult your
convenience, and that of the Officers and Mem-
bers of the Corps under your command, as far
as it is practicable, and which is entirely confor-
mable to my own disposition, I am desirous of
naming a day, in concert with you, that would
be most suitable: but as it would be too incon-
venient to assemble the different Captains and
Commandants, for that purpose, the alternative
is for me to propose a distant day, as well that
each corps may have full notice and time to pre-
pare for this Inspection, as that you may please
to inform me, through Brigade-Major Harding,
if any strong reason should operate to change that
day to some other, evidently preferable, I there-
fore propose, that the day of this Inspection be
fixed for Monday, the 12th inst. at 12 o'clock.

"It is most desirable that there should be a
full attendance at this Parade, and that the Arms
and Accoutrements of absent Members should be
there produced.—I have the honour to be, Sir,
