

A morning paper states the receipt of other foreign journals to the 23d inst. but does not say what they are, but only that they do not furnish any thing interesting. If there is no typographical error in the date, we may certainly be allowed to augur favourably from their silence respecting any fresh victories obtained by the enemy; but on the other hand is it not singular, if the Russians have defeated the French, that their successes should not be mentioned in the papers alluded to?

We are not, however, without some hope that the reported successes of the French will prove unfounded, or at any rate greatly exaggerated, but till further accounts reach us, we shall not be freed from our present apprehensions.

*Dutch East Indiamen.*

In the Star of Saturday we announced the capture of a Dutch frigate and two Indiamen, richly laden, on their voyage from Batavia. We are happy to be enabled, by the kindness of a valuable correspondent, to lay the particulars before the Public. The following is a correct translation of the dispatches of the late Governor General of the India Neederlande (the Netherlands) found on board the Danish ship Lisette, detained on her voyage from Batavia to Copenhagen, and sent into Dartmouth by his Majesty's ship Pluto, Richard Janverin, Esq. Commander.

*Dutch Official Dispatches.*

"With the severest feelings of affliction I have to mention, that according to the latest authentic intelligence here, upon the 20th July, 1806, in the latitude of Saleyer Islands, the Batavian frigate the Pallas, and the corvette the William (coming from Amboyna, and having under convoy the Victorie and the Batavia, two very large ships, belonging to the Company, completely laden with mace, cloves, and nutmegs,) had an engagement with an English frigate and a brig, and the unfortunate issue was, that the frigate was forced to surrender, and both the Company's ships are become the prey of the enemy. We know no further particulars, except, that the William is escaped by flight, and got to Macasser; but the intelligence has cast universal dejection over every one here, and truly not without reason, as the loss amounts to full a million dollars in specie, which the sale of the spices was to have replaced, and the blow will be severely felt by the Treasury the chest of which is already in so exhausted a condition."
