 to penetrate into the Cathedral of Christ-church,
 to plunder the Communion-plate.

LIMERICK, FEBRUARY 6.

His Grace the Lord Lieutenant has been pleased
 to appoint Stephen Dickson, of Ballinaguile, Esq.
 Barrister at Law, and son of Samuel Dickson,
 Esq. of this city, to be High Sheriff of this county,
 for the ensuing year.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty
 have fixed the 12th of February for the departure
 of the next convoy from the port of Cork to the
 West Indies.

Last Wednesday night, a number of robbers
 attacked the house of James Fenlan, near Cahir-
 conlish, in this county, and entered it undisguised,
 and after searching for some time carried off a
 considerable sum in cash, a quantity of bacon,
 spirits, &c. they afterwards went to the house of
 one Farrell, in the same neighbourhood, broke
 into it and robbed him of sixty guineas.

Same night, the shop of Mr. N. Fayle, in Mun-
 gret-street, was attempted to be robbed, by some
 persons cutting the pannel of one of the window-
 shutters, and would have effected their intention,
 but for the barking of a dog inside, which alarm-
 ed the family, who instantly went to one of the
 windows, and observed two men and a woman
 making off.

We are informed that there are Barracks for
 800 cavalry to be immediately erected on the
 Curragh and that the plan has already been ap-
 proved of; certainly no situation can be so well
 adapted for the manœuvres of cavalry or large
 squadrons, as the Curragh.

We hear also, it is in contemplation to erect a
 Barrack for 1000 infantry in the vicinity of Mul-
 lingar.

Wednesday the 14th regiment of foot marched
 into Cork, on their route to Fermoy.

The 1st, 2d and 3d Garrison Battalions have
 arrived at Cove; the two latter marched into Cork
 on Wednesday last.

This day the first division of the Kilkenny
 Militia marched in here from Cahir, and to-mor-
 row the remainder will arrive, to do duty, in the
 room of the 69th regiment, which marched hence
 for New Geneva, where they will embark and
 proceed for Lincoln, to recruit for the completion
 of the battalion.
