Goodwin stood capitally indicted, for on the 17th December last, embezzled a copy of Ireland Post Bill, sent by the house of Caldwell, Esq. & Co. to a Mr. Patton, proprietor of mills, near Kilkullen, in the county of Wick. In a letter containing post bills to the value of 50*l.* That for which the prisoner was committed to prison of 5*l.* value.

The preliminary evidence by the Officers of the National Bank having been gone through, Mr. Caldwell, jun. and a clerk belonging to the house, proved the remittance of the 50*l.* in post bills, Mr. Patton, also the insertion of the letter in the Post Office.

A Gentleman's servant near Gloucester-place, proved that the prisoner presented him the bill in question to get change, and keep a pound which he owed him for two years before, both being formerly fellow-servants, and that amount borrowed by the prisoner from the witness.—Some time occurred in procuring the change. It was at length had in the purchase of a hat, and the bill identified by the latter's clerk.—The forgery of Patton's indorsement was also proved.

Mr. De Joncourt proved, that the prisoner was in the situation of an extra Guard, waiting for a better situation at the Post Office. That he was employed on the night of the 18th December last, in the sorting room at the post office, facing letters, or putting their superscriptions upwards, in order to receive the stamps.

Christie, the former witness, had been apprehended with the prisoner, and lodged in Newgate for a night—the prisoner, as appeared by the money of M'Dowal, Deputy Gaoler, made a confession to him of the embezzlement.

Edward Stanley, of Stephen's-green, Esq. recalled to the prisoner's character, deposed, that he knew him for one year, that the prisoner was in his service; afterwards, while in the employment of the Post Office, he had often committed to his charge packets to carry, containing several pounds in value.

Several witnesses deposed to the prisoner's industry and general good conduct—one of whom was in his service for eleven years.

The Inspectors General of Excise in Ireland, are in future to reside in the city of Dublin, in order that they may be in readiness to be employed throughout the kingdom when occasion required.

Tuesday last, his Majesty's ship *Acasta*, capt. Beaver, arrived at Cork, to convey the outward bound West India fleet to their destination.

The Cork mail-coach on its way to Dublin was attacked on Monday night, about ten o'clock, between Castledermot and Timolin, by a number of persons armed, who fired several shots at the coachman and guards, by one of which the former was slightly wounded; but owing to his extreme good conduct and the spirit of the guards (one of whom shot the person who held the leading horses). The coach and mails escaped.—The passengers, one Gentleman and three Ladies, received no injury whatever.

The exports of provisions from this country for the last year, are greater than have ever been known. In the town and neighbourhood of Waterford alone, no less than fifty thousand hogs have been killed and salted for bacon, for exportation to England, in addition to the large quantity annually taken for the army and navy. The exports from Cork have been also proportionably large.
