Female Fashions for March.

English Costume—Walking Dress.

This consists of a Polish robe of purple velvet,
open in the front, round gradually from the bot-
tom towards the lappels, which are continued
across the shoulders, and finished in points upon
the back. A chemitte of the same, with high full
collar, the whole trimmed entirely round with red
fox, mole, leopard, or squirrel furs. A rich cord
and tassel are fastened in the middle of the back
and skirt cut in one, and sleeve made to fit the
arm. A Polish cap of the same materials trimmed
with furs; a cord and tassels suspended from the
right side of the crown, York tau gloves, with
rose of purple shoes.

Evening Dress.—A round train of white satin,
buttoned down the left side, the back very low
and quite plain: high and double and puffed sleeves
with wrapped front. Military sash of cobweb
satin, with gold spots commencing from the back
of the right shoulder, crossing the waist behind,
and passing under the right side of the bosom,
gathered into a pearbrooch at the opposite corner,
and flowing within a quarter of a yard to the bot-
tom of the dress, where it is finished with a rich
gold tassel. Hair turned up in the Grecian style;
plain hands brought to a point on the forehead
irregularly curled at the ears and on the crown of
the head, and confined with a coronet, or diadem
of pearl. Pearl necklace, earrings, and brace-
lets, gold armllet. White kid gloves. Shoes of
white satin, embroidered with gold. Fan of
white crape, with gold spangled border.
