party of cavalry and infantry, to Tullaven, where the crime was committed, and having prayed a considerable time, they were launched into eternity, after having protested their innocence, before many thousands of country people assembled at the place of execution. Their bodies were brought back at a late hour last night, and deposited in the Surgeons' Hall, county Infirmary, for dissection, according to law.

Yesterday John Gorman and James Sheeran, were brought in here under a transmit warrant from London, and committed to the county Jail, charged with being concerned in the murder of Timothy Mehan, some years ago, at the Fair of Dromin, in this county, for which James Keenan, was executed last March.

Last Sunday night, some evil disposed person, fired a musket-ball into the shop of Hackett, whip-maker, opposite the Exchange, which passed thro' the window-shut and glass, and was found next morning on the floor; the place not being occupied by night, prevented the intended mischief.

On Thursday morning last, Francis Magee, a private in the Tyrone Militia, quartered at Wexford, put a period to his existence, by shooting himself with his own firelock. He loaded it with a ball-cartridge, having previously taken off the guard, placing the muzzle close to his left side, and pressing the trigger with his foot, the contents passed through his heart. He had been in the regiment since its first formation, and bore an excellent character; but is said to have been subject to temporary fits of insanity, heightened probably by domestic inquietude.—An inquest was held on the body, and returned a verdict of *Felo de se*.

Ennis, March 14.—Last Tuesday, J. Downes, Esq. Surveyor of Excise, detected a private distillery at full work, on the lands of Moher, in the parish of Inchicronan, in which he seized the still, with every other utensil belonging to it.—On his removing the seizure, the country people rose up, some armed with guns, and rescued the still, as Mr. Downes had no other assistants at that time than Mr. James Roche, Gauger, who accompanied him.—The next day a party of the Longford Militia, under the command of Lieut. Wright, came to his assistance, as also William Butler, of Bunnahow, Esq. one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for this county, when the still was retaken, owing chiefly to Mr. Butler's exertions.—Mr. Downes then proceeded to the lands of Mayree, in the parish of Kilskeedy, where he detected another private distillery, which he found also at full work. The still, with several other utensils were seized, and after destroying considerable quantities of potale and singlings, &c. &c. both stills were brought in here, and lodged in his Majesty's stores.

It would be an act of much humanity to inform the peasantry of the fatal consequences of resisting an Officer in the seizure of Stills, or destroying of private Distilleries, as every person convicted of such offence, must have sentence of death and execution pronounced upon him. It would be well done if the Clergy would inform their flocks of this circumstance; and the country gentlemen should feel it an incumbent duty to make his tenantry acquainted therewith, as the means of saving from an ignominious death the infatuated persons engaged in the illicit traffic of private distilling.
