

...with a faculty of children. The learned counsel went at great length into a review of the base-ness and turpitude of the defendant's mind, in de-ceiving a respectable and worthy man of the af-fections of the partner of his cares and the mo-ther of his children. We regret not being able to follow the learned and eloquent counsel thro' the most admirable speech.

Several respectable witnesses proved that Mr. Henry, prior to the defendant's inter-course in his house, lived on terms of mutual love and affection.

Other witnesses were produced, who deposed that they frequently saw the defendant take un-warrantable liberties with Mrs. Henry, inconsis-tent with, and degrading to the character of a virtuous woman, and that the defendant, in the absence of Mr. Henry, frequently visited her at unseasonable hours.

The evidence given by the above witnesses, was nearly conclusive of a criminal connexion between the parties; but their guilt was proved in the clear-est manner by a young gentleman who was a tu-tor in the family, whose testimony, on his direct and cross-examination, we deem wholly unfit for the public eye.

Counsellor Joy made an ingenuous speech for the defendant, in mitigation of damages.

Counsellor Scriven, spoke to evidence, for up-wards of an hour, in an impressive and energetic style; and declared that the utmost damages the Jury could give, was not an adequate punishment for the inherent vileness of the degraded defen-dant.

The Learned Judge recapitulated the evidence with his usual legal knowledge and strength of un-derstanding. The Jury retired for a short time, and brought in a verdict for the plaintiff 4000*l.* damages, and 6*d.* costs, to the entire satisfaction of the court and county.

Tralee, March 20.—Yesterday was tried be-fore the Hon. Justice Fletcher, and a Special Jury, the long pending cause, in which William Todd Jones, Esq. was plaintiff, and Bernard Shaw, Esq. Collector of Cork, was defendant, on an action for a libellous publication in the *Cork Ad-vertiser*, when a verdict was found in favour of the plaintiff, for 2250*l.* damages, with 6*d.* costs.

This day, a very interesting cause, in which Thomas Connell, Esq. was Plaintiff and John Woodwood, Esq. Defendant, came on to be tried, before the Honorable Judge Fletcher.—The dama-ges were laid at 1000*l.* brought by the Plaintiff for criminal intercourse with his wife; and after a patient hearing, the Jury returned a verdict for Plaintiff 100*l.* damages and 6*d.* costs.
