 "General Kalkreuth is expected at Dantzic, as Commandant."
 "The Copenhagen papers say, that the garrison of Dantzic has totally defeated the Poles.—General L'Estocq has taken a large convoy of provisions going to the French army.
 "General Blucher and his two sons, who are engaged against General Victor, Capt. Fleury, and General Dumas, depart to day for Berlin, to visit the French head-quarters, on the orders of Marshal Berthier. It is supposed that he will be made the bearer of proposals of peace."

Dispatches were also received last night from Lord Hutchinson—in substance as follows:

That the war was becoming daily more popular through every part of the Russian Empire—that the Levies filled beyond all expectation; that every body and corporation had come forward with voluntary loans, subscriptions, and free gifts.

The Hetman of the Cossacks had formed a junction with General Bennigsen; the army of the latter had thus been recruited with nearly forty thousand of the best irregular troops in the world. The French armies had learned this union, and it had produced a most sensible impression on them. The Cossacks, in fact, were the only force which was feared by the French.

General Bennigsen had advanced in consequence of this union. General Buxhoevden was recalled from the command of his army, but not disgraced.

In the House of Commons, last night, Mr. H. Martin, after a speech of considerable length, moved—

"That an humble Address be presented to his Majesty, beseeching that his Majesty will be pleased not to grant for life, the office of Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, or any other office usually held during pleasure."

After a long discussion the motion was carried by a majority of 93.

On Monday, the Irish Stamp duty Bill was read a second time and the Irish Paper duty Bill a third time, and passed.

Head-quarters at Warsaw, Feb. 27.

From the Officers of the Staff.

"The Colonel-Commandant of the army having been informed, notwithstanding the orders of all officers for the army to join their respective corps, those excepted who are wounded, or charged with paying and cloathing the troops, that there are still some among them insensible to the voice of honour, and who shamefully conceal themselves at a moment when their presence is required in the most pressing manner, it is ordered, that every Officer in Warsaw, who is not furnished with regular leave of absence, shall be arrested within twenty four hours, and conducted from brigade to brigade, to his respective corps.

His Majesty the Emperor has ordered a Pulk of light Polish cavalry to be raised, consisting of four squadrons, to be incorporated into his Imperial Guard, and to perform duty conjointly. A proclamation has been addressed to the youth of Poland upon this occasion.
