

of Ritz and Voss, was on the 10th in suit of the French; they came up with guard of the enemy at Preuschmark, and 1000 prisoners and three pieces of cannon. In the battle of Eylau, the French lost eight pieces of cannon, and thirty-nine stand of arms; many of them surmounted with Eagles; and of the Legion of Honour likewise in the hands of the Russians. During the shell from a howitzer fell within a few paces of Bonaparte, and probably would have killed him, had not General Corbino, one of the Generals, rushed forward and pulled out this officer was shortly after killed by a shell, within a short distance of Napoleon. It is reported, received a slight wound on his back.

These reinforcements are daily joining the army. Between the 22d of February and the 10th of March, nearly 90,000 men, most from Asia, passed through Memel, for the Army. It is reported to have made a very successful sortie from Stralsund, in which the French stated to have lost 3000 men in killed, and prisoners. On the 10th of March, the Elector of Hesse, from the French Emperor, declares that he saw Bonaparte at Stralsund on the 12th. A corps of the French Emperor Ney, was then in possession of the position of Tonnenberg, (where a famous battle was fought in 1410), and another corps of the Emperor was on the Vistula.

The French Commandant of Stralsund, the Emperor's garrison comprises 15,000 men, and the Emperor is about to join them from Ystadt.

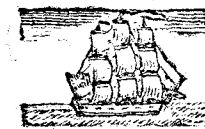
