CASTLE CHAPEL.

At two o'clock this afternoon, His Grace the Duke of Bedford laid the first stone of the foundation of a New Vice Regal Chapel in the Castle-Yard. His Grace was attended by the Lord Bishop of Limerick, the Rev. Dr. Hunt, the State Chaplains, the Officers of the Household, and the Commissioners of the Board of Works. In a cavity of the stone were deposited coins of the present year of his Majesty's Reign, and a Plate with the following Inscription:
