QUARTER ASSEMBLY.

This meeting took place with stronger sympathies of suavity than many we recollect for preceding years.

Mr. Giffard rose, and in a short speech expatiated on the virtues of the King; concluding with an assertion, that he was a Christian, and had a Christian's regard to his Coronation Oath. He therefore moved that an humble Address of Thanks should be presented to him from the Corporation of the City, for the late eminent proofs his Majesty had given of an adherence to the welfare of his faithful people of Ireland and the Religion of the State, as by law established.

The question was carried unanimously, and passed the Board of Aldermen, after refreshment, without a dissentient voice.

The provincial prints contain nothing of importance, and afford not the slightest reason for any apprehension on account of the public tranquility. The Circuit Trials, with one exception, exhibit no instances of delinquency, not the result of mere individual depravity. In some of the circuits the Lawyers sent to direct the crown prosecutions, did not find it necessary to prosecute officially.

On Tuesday night last, some villains attempted to burn two valuable Woods in the vicinity of Clonmel, belonging to Colonel Bagwell and Mr. Sparrow, by placing a quantity of straw in each, to which they set fire. After some damage having been sustained, the conflagration was happily extinguished, as the night was uncommonly calm. This sort of wanton villainy is unaccountable, and especially when it is considered that Mr. Bagwell is a most exemplary landlord, and a generous neighbour, and that he has for some years expended among his labouring poor, no less a sum than 1600*l*.

A few days since, a dog was observed in the vicinity of Milltown, co. Clare, with an infant in its mouth, which it had picked up in an adjoining potatoe garden; some labourers, who observed the circumstance, pursued the dog, and interred the body.—It proved to be that of a new-born female, of which the undiscovered mother had been delivered on the spot where the dog scented it.

Yesterday, near 100 young men recruits arrived here on their way to join the County Limerick Militia, now quartered in Dundalk.

On Tuesday last, John White, Esq. Surveyor of Excise, assisted by Mr. Molony and a detachment of the Queen's County regiment, seized and destroyed an immense quantity of malt, potale, and vessels, in the neighbourhood of Mount-Shannon and Tomgrany.—On this occasion, the Rev. Wm. Read, a Magistrate for the Counties of Clare and Galway, gave Mr. White and his party every assistance and protection, and approved in the fullest degree of the manner in which this very essential duty was done;—too much praise cannot be given to Mr. White for his activity and exertion in suppressing illicit trade, and thereby giving protection to the fair trader.
