

description of quality, and branded accordingly. On the butter being minutely examined in the Plaintiff's stores, it was discovered that the original quality marks had been erased, and others of a superior indication substituted. On examining the quality of the butter, the fraud became evident, and this action was brought to recover redress for the injury which the Plaintiffs had sustained.

The case was made out so clear and manifest, that in an early stage of the business, the Counsel for the defendant, (Serjeant Cockle) interposed, and said it was impossible to make any defence; and the Plaintiffs obtained a verdict with 210*l.* damages.

On the decision of this trial, some other causes of a similar nature depended; and it is to be hoped that an end will now be put to the unjust proceedings of altering the quality marks of butter which has been too long and successfully practised by some description of people at Cork, to the serious evil both of the export merchant and the fair dealer.
