On Monday last in the Court of King's Bench, the Lord Chief Justice sat for the trial of Nisi Prius causes; the only cause tried that day was a trial in which G. F. Moulds, an Attorney, was Plaintiff, and Peter Isaac Charles, was Defendant -the action was brought for slander, uttered by the Defendant, against the Plaintiff, who in his professional avocation made an affidavit on the 26th Dec. 1805, which the Defendant alleged was false; and on the 16th April, 1806, declared, " that Plaintiff had perjured himself, and that the Defandant had given directions to his Attorney to prosecute him for the same;" there were two other counts in the declaration, one stating that the Defendant had said of the Plaintiff, that " he has perjured himself;" the other "he has taken a false oath;" the damages were laid at 1000l. and the Defendant pleaded the general issue. The Jury found a verdict for the Plaintiff, 2001. damages, and 6d. costs.
