UNLICENCED DISTILLATION.

This evil, the magnitude of which almost exceeds belief, prevails chiefly in the northern, western, and some of the central Counties of Ireland; an idea, however, of its extent may be formed from the number of unlicensed Stills that appear to have been seized in the last five years, viz.

An active and intelligent Officer, especially employed in the suppression of unlicensed Stills in the year 1805, states, that he detected 101 in the Barony of Innishowen, in the space of 36 hours, and that he believes that Barony alone contained upwards of 800. Another Officer, employed on the like service, states his belief, that almost every second house in the lower part of that Barony, has a private Still or Malthouse. An eminent Distiller in Dundalk has reported, that, during the last year, unlicensed Distillation increased in his vicinity and the adjoining counties, he believes, nearly six fold: and that customers, to whom he formerly sold ten puncheons of spirits at a time, now take but a single puncheon, and that only for the purpose of getting permits, to cover in part the stock they take from the unlicensed distillers; and a distiller in Sligo informs us, that previous to his setting up a distillery there, 15 puncheons of spirits were

DEATHS.—Saturday the 25th ult. in the 108d year of her age, Mrs. Hannah Wilson, of Keswick, Cumberland, England, and formerly housekeeper to the late Governor Stephenson, of that place: In recording this instance of unusual longevity, we trust some account of the deceased will not be deemed wholly uninteresting to our readers. She was born at Cockermonth, in the year 1705, which town she quitted at the age of fourteen, and became a domestic in the above respectable family; which she faithfully served for a period of 75 years, comprehending five successions of masters.—As a reward for her fidelity, her latter years were made comfortable through the kindness of her last worthy master, R. Stephenson, Esq. of London, making the whole period of her dependance upon one family very little short of ninety years! The deceased enjoyed her faculties to within a few weeks of her death; and, what will be deemed remarkable, cut two new teeth after her eighty-fifth year. She lived in four reigns, and was regarded by many as the most faithful living historian of the place; the events of the year fifteen being not wholly obliterated, and those of forty-five perfectly fresh in her recollection. She was attended to her grave by many of the principal inhabitants of the town of Keswick; a respect becomingly paid to her fair character and venerable years. It may be further observed, that the deceased has for some time survived every individual whom at the age of 14 she found an inhabitant of Keswick.
