

DUBLIN—JUNE 6.

Last night, sailed for England, the Right Hon. Henry Grattan. His amiable Lady, who is now in London, being in a very dangerous state of health, is, we are concerned to hear, the cause of his present visit to that country.

From the best information, there were in the Phoenix Park on Thursday last, about 4,600 troops of the Line and Militia—3000 of the City Yeomanry—500 of the County Ditto—making upwards of 8000 men.

On Monday night last, about ten o'clock, as Mr. Justice Sharky, of Rathmines, was returning from Donnybrook towards this city, in company with his family and a lady and gentleman, he was stoped by ten or twelve men, all remarkably well armed and well dressed, and robbed of his watch, &c.

Four of the miscreants said to be concerned in the murder of the Rev. Mr. Macarthy, are, thro' the vigilance of Major Sirr, apprehended and lodged in Newgate. One of them, named Murphy, a silver-plater, has become King's Evidence, and has made some useful discoveries, which, we trust, will lead to the detection of the remainder of a gang which has long infested the neighbourhood of Chapelizod and Leixlip.—The names of the men taken are—Murphy, M'Mahon, Padden, and Dwyer.

His Grace the Archbishop of Cashel has instituted the Rev. Frederick Neligan to the valuable Rectories and Vicarages of Kilmastulla and Templekelly, in the Diocese of Emly.

An Honourable Gentleman now confined in the King's Bench for debts, said to amount to 40,000*l.* has contrived to procure his Election to a seat in the House of Commons, and intends to claim the interference of the Speaker on the score of his violated privilege as a Member of that House, if the Marshal should refuse his liberation, to enable him to attend his representative duty in the ensuing Parliament.

IRISH ELECTIONS.

We gave on Monday a general view of the returns for the Irish Counties, and the cities of Dublin, Cork, and Derry.—These, which constitute the great mass of popular representation in Ireland, are decidedly in favour of the present Ministry; even by pressing into their ranks men who have either never, or only incidentally, voted with them—"the Talents" are able; but to reckon upon thirty of this number, and upon a division, will feel a deficiency of at least half their number.—Few of the Irish Boroughs are in a position to produce a contest; but in those which have been contested the pre-eminence of the real friends of the Constitution has been fully manifested: these have been—
