The Hercules, Capt. Rogers, is arrived at Li-
verpool from Fortola, from whence she sailed on
the 29th of April, with the Fleet, consisting of
about 150 sail, under convoy of his Majesty's
ships Venus and Osprey, and parted from them
same night.

The Navy.—Monday se'night a Court-Mar-
tial was held on board the Gladiator, on Lieute-
nants Alcock and Bates, of his Majesty's ship
Barfleur, for conniving at the escape of a priso-
ner who was under arrest. Lieut. A. was acquit-
ted; Lient. Bates was reprimanded, and dismis-
sed the Barfleur.

On the following day, Lieutenant W. Penny-
man Stevenson, of his Majesty's ship Malabar,
was tried for neglect of duty. The charge was
proved, and he was sentenced to be dismissed
from the Navy. Commodore Keats, President.

By letters from Coteva we learn, that in the
beginning of March the devotees from all the
adjacent provinces, were assembling to proceed
to the holy bathing place, on Sauger Island. It
is stated, that 20,000 persons passed through the
country, in the course of a week, on their way to
the Ganges. The India Government has taken
effectual measures to prevent the sacrifice of chil-
dren, which were usual on this occasion. Some
Missionaries from Serampore and other parts,
attended, and preached to the natives, and were
heard with attention.

ton Castle East Indiaman, and a short time prior to this, her
favourite daughter died in childbed. To complete this scene
of human misery, for the last twelve months this unfortunate
sufferer had been labouring under a complication of diseases,
the anguish of which was in a degree diminished by the calm-
ness she evinced in bending with pious resignation to the will
of the Almighty. She has left three most amiable daughters
behind her, all married, who, together with the widow of
her youngest son, alleviated, by their unremitting assiduity
and tenderness, the latter moments of their much lamented
relative.
