

Sailed yesterday evening, to attend their duty in the Imperial Parliament, Messrs. Talbot, Parnell, Herbert, D. Browne, Nevill, and Colonel Longfield; also, the Earl of Clarendon, and Lord Longueville.

A great variety of statements having been made respecting the melancholy fate of Mr. McCarthy, we think it necessary to lay before our readers the following, which we have good reason to suppose is founded on fact.—On Wednesday the 3d inst. the unfortunate Gentleman dined with the Steward of Lord Donoughmore, having held for a few days, previously, a station in that neighbourhood; whilst returning homeward, about ten o'clock, he he was fired upon, by a gang of ruffians, six in number, who had no knowledge whatsoever either of his person or profession; he fell, it is imagined, almost instantly lifeless; his pockets were then rifled of his watch, &c.—Mr. Lynch, jun. of Lucan, who accompanied him from Lord Donoughmore's, had been thrown from horse before the gang of robbers made their appearance, and the injury which he has received, is solely attributable to the effects thereof.—*Freeman's Journal.*

A number of poor Debtors were brought up to the Court of Common Pleas on Saturday, in order to be discharged under the maintenance act, but many of whom, from the negligence of their Attornies were obliged to be remanded to prison.

On which Mr. Cash was declared duly elected, who returned a concise speech of thanks and professions.

COURT OF CHANCERY.

The Marquis of Donegall, v. Isaac Bernall, and contrary.

These causes which have been for a considerable time past depending the Court of Chancery, and much the subject of observation, came on to be heard before Lord Manners, the Lord High Chancellor of Ireland, on the 3d instant, and after a hearing on the proofs made on both sides (which took up several days), his Lordship was pleased to decree the four several *post obit* bonds mentioned in the pleadings, for the sums of £46,000 and £40,000, executed by the Marquis when Lord Belfast, and payable to the defendant, Mr. Isaac Bernall, on the death of his Lordship's father; as also one other bond for £60,000, executed by the Marquis of Donegall to the said Bernall; as also three deeds between the parties, to be all fraudulent and obtained by imposition, and dismissed the bill filed by Mr. Bernall, the object of which was to carry these deeds and securities into execution. And his Lordship directed that a fair account should be taken of all sums of money actually paid or advanced by Mr. Bernall to the Marquis, or any person for him, and which afterwards came into the hands of the Marquis, and that the securities were to remain for no more than should be reported to have been *bona fide* advanced, and on this account the Marquis is to have credit for all sums from time to time heretofore levied under several writs of *fiery facias* issued against his Lordship's goods and chattels, and in the mean time awarded an injunction to restrain Mr. Bernall from proceeding at law on the foot of the judgments obtained on the bonds.

The friends of Lord Donegall alledge the sums already levied under these writs, far exceed any real demand defendant, Bernall, ever had against him. The decision of the Lord Chancellor has given general satisfaction.

Very many of the regiments in Ireland are at present and have lately been, changing quarters; but the Kerry Militia, now quartered in Galway, has not yet received a route—it is expected they will be removed to Ennis.

Last Tuesday, Patrick Madden, a mason, of John-st. expired, in consequence of a fall down his cellar steps, when in the act of making a kick at his wife, which he missed, about a fortnight back, since which period he never uttered a sentence, and lingered in the greatest agony till the day of his dissolution.

Tuesday evening, four houses were burnt near Whitepoint, Cove, Cork. Fortunately no person was hurt.

Yesterday, two men were brought in here and committed to the county jail, charged with being concerned in a riot at Patrick's-Well, on Tuesday last.

This morning the Trumpeter of the Kenry yeoman cavalry, was brought in from Palace, and committed to said jail, charged with stabbing a man with a bayonet.

The inquest which we stated in our last, to have been sitting on the body of Patrick Brown, returned a verdict "that he died by the visitation of God."

Tuesday morning, the 2d inst. as Mrs. Taylor, wife of Thomas Taylor, Esq. of Dominick-street, Galway, was sitting near the parlour fire, a spark flew into her lap, which set her clothes on fire; and though the servant was near her, and rolled a large cloth (the cover of the table) about her, and the maid at the moment coming into the room—still, though every exertion was made to extinguish the fire, all efforts were unavailing, and the entire of her clothes, as well as the woollen cloth, were consumed in a moment. Notwithstanding her dreadful situation, she walked up stairs to her bed-room, complained of violent cold, conversed with her family and friends till early on the morning of the following day, when she expired, having during that time, never complained of the smallest pain.
