Wexford, June 25.—The following dreadful
accident happened at Ballyraekin, near Ferns,
on Saturday:—As Mr. John Rice, with several
others, were standing round the mouth of one
of his brother's lime-kilns, observing a cinder,
he imprudently leaped on it, and the kiln not
having been drawn for some time before, and the
stones mostly burnt into lime, he instantly went
down, and before any assistance could be given,
was burnt to death.—Every means, however,
was used to recover the body, by throwing water
on the kiln, and afterwards pulling it down.
When they effected their purpose, it was a most
shocking spectacle, being nearly reduced to a
cinder.

Tuesday morning the body of Mr. Scott, gar-
dener to Sir John Blunden, was found in a field
near Castlebunden, county Kilkenny. The coro-
ner's inquest sat on the body, and no marks of
violence appearing, gave a verdict.—“Died by
the sudden visitation of Providence.”

Early on Tuesday morning, a new-born infant,
abandoned by its unnatural parent, was left at the
door of a house, about a mile from town, rolled
in a piece of flannel; it was found by some
labourers who were going to their work.

A T a Meeting held in the Town of Rathkeale, County
of Limerick, pursuant to Public Advertisement, call-
ing on the Gentlemen of the County to assemble, and consi-
der the best line of road to run a Mail Coach on, from the
City of Limerick to the Town of Tralee.—It was first re-
solved, That the road attempted to be established by a few
individuals, without the knowledge of the County at large
by Court-Bridge and the Shannon, appears to this Meeting
utterly unadvisable, inasmuch as such line would be the
longest, the most expensive, and the least useful.

2. It was resolved, That the Coach should run through
Adare to Rathkeale, being the first Town in the County, in
the centre of a most respectable and populous neighbourhood
and on the most direct line.

3. It was resolved, That from Rathkeale, the further ru-
of the Coach be through the Town of Newcastle to Knock-
brack, which, though about three miles out of the direct
line by Ardagh, yet deserves the preference to every other
inasmuch as the great population of the Town and surrou-
ding neighbourhood, the excellence of the roads already
established, and the great saving of expense accruing there-
from to the County, entitle it to an impartial preference.

4. It was resolved, That a Memorial to the above effect
should be forthwith drawn up, with a request to our Repr-
sentatives, to forward the same to Government, and the Pos-
tmasters General.

Resolved, by the Meeting at large, that Government will
please to take into their consideration the shortest line of
Road, the Towns through which the Coach may pass, to
accommodation for the Coach thereon, and which line
Road will cost the County least Money.
