With pleasure we add to the above accounts, which our readers need not be informed, rest chiefly on French authority, that some of the private letters by the mail, state, that the encmy were by no means so successful on the 14th, as their own statements indicate. Some of them even say, that the Russians will be found to claim the victory, when their accounts shall appear.

We understand a Letter has been received from Lord Hutchinson, which gives a more favourable account of the disasters on the Continent, than has appeared. But even his Statement admits that the whole Russian centre was completely overpow. ered.-The French entered Konigsberg, on the 16th ultimo.
