

Mr. HOBHOUSE brought up the report of the Committee on the Lush Customs' Bill, which was agreed to, and the Bill ordered to be ingrossed.

Sir JOHN NEWPORT said, he had abstained from stating to the House before, what he intended to offer upon the subject of this bill, lest he might incur the charge of wishing to throw any impediment in the way of its progress. He was aware, however, that one of the mischiefs arising from the late dissolution, was the delay that this bill already experienced, by which the Custom Duties of Ireland would cease several days before this bill could pass into law; and notwithstanding any retrospective clause in the Bill, the revenue must sustain, from this circumstance, losses which could never be recovered, as had been the case in three instances already upon record. An other point upon which he had to observe was, that this Bill only went to revive the old Custom Duties and took no notice whatever of the new Schedule of Duties which he had proposed shortly before the dissolution, and which went to form part of the Ways for the year, to the amount of 20,000l.—In consequence, therefore, of not reviving that Schedule, the Ways and Means for Ireland would be so much defective for the year, unless other means were found. Another source of Ways and Means he had proposed, to the amount of 80,000l. was, by discontinuing the bounty upon large stills in Ireland, which having completely effected its purpose by abolishing small and fraudulent stills, was no longer necessary. If he rightly understood the Right Hon. Gentleman's (Mr. Foster's) intention, he proposed to abandon this source. Under such circumstances, he himself could be no longer answerable for the efficiency of the Ways and Means for Ireland this year, and he must, therefore, leave the onus with the Right Hon. Gentleman.

Mr. FOSTER was glad, from the Right Hon. Baronet's offering no objection to this Bill, or its contents, that it had his approbation.—(No, no, content to let the Bill pass, in its present form, and feel himself at liberty to adopt the additional duties proposed by the Right Hon. Baronet's schedule, if they should appear to be necessary. He differed from him, however, materially, in his calculation on the bounty upon large stills, which he computed would amount to 80,000l. for as the source was not to commence operation before September, the produce, of course, could not exceed 20,000l. the fourth of the estimate for the year: besides, the discontinuance of the bounty would operate to revive the evil it had put down, and produce a loss in a short time, greatly exceeding the bounty to be saved.

The Bill was ordered to be read the third time to-morrow.

MR. WHITEHEAD'S MOTION.

Mr. WHITEHEAD rose to contradict a rumour which had gone forth, stating that he had postponed his motion upon the State of the Nation till Friday next. He had no such intention, and the House might be assured he should bring it forward on Monday.

ARMY ESTIMATES.

The SEC. at WAR brought up the estimates ordered on a former night.

Lord HOWICK asked if they contained estimates of the additional expence of Volunteer Corps?

The SEC. at WAR said it was calculated that the sum already proposed would cover all the additional expence on that head, for the part of the year now to come: an estimate, therefore, became necessary.

Lord HOWICK and Mr. WINDHAM thought that it was proper that the additional expence of Inspecting Field Officers, &c. should be known, nor was it sufficient, because a sum had been voted for a service in one view of a case, that it

embarked. LIMERICK, JULY 10.

We hear his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, intends honoring the Races of Limerick with his presence—and means to reside during his stay at Mount Shannon, the beautiful seat of the Countess of Clare: this meeting promises uncommon sport, and will be attended by more amateurs of the turf, more beauty and more fashion, than any other in this kingdom. The Stewards are incessing in their efforts to give the utmost satisfaction.

Yesterday the South Cork militia, quartered in this city, were reviewed at Newcastle by Brig. General Michel—after firing and going through the different evolutions, the General expressed himself highly pleased with the martial appearance steadiness and excellent discipline of the regiment.

Same day, a number of well-looking young men, recruits, arrived here from Lancashire, where they were raised, and joined the 2d battalion of the 31st regt. quartered in this city.

Same day, seven unfortunate females, who infested the barracks of this city, were taken, carted, and belled out of the town—it, however, had not the desired effect, for, after being liberated, they returned same evening.

The 63d regiment is removed from Clonmel to Cashel, the head quarters. Three companies of same regiment marched on Monday last for Tipperary, under the command of Capt. Norton.

Mrs. Carroll, relict of the late Mr. John Carroll, of this city, school-master, died suddenly at her lodgings in Bridge-street. She went to bed last night, in apparent good health, and was found dead this morning by her servant, on going to the chamber to call her to breakfast.

A young woman not twenty years old, was committed to the gaol of Longford last week, for the murder of her husband, an athletic young man, at Rusky in that county. It appears they had not been married more than 6 months, and lived together very unhappily, her father had forced the marriage contrary to her inclination. She made the unfortunate man intoxicated, and with the assistance of two females younger than herself, when he was asleep accomplished her dreadful purpose, by fastening a pair of tongs about his neck, and strangling him. She and one of her accomplices have confessed their guilt, it does not appear that she was influenced to commit this most atrocious act by an attachment to any other person.

Early on Monday morning last, a girl who had been a servant to the head gardener of Sir Arthur Wellesley at his house in the Phoenix Park, Dublin, was discovered hanging on one of the trees in the demesne; the coroner held an inquest, and the jury returned a verdict, that she had put an end to her own existence without the intervention of any other person. It appeared that she got up about 2 o'clock in the morning and having got out through the window of the room where she slept, she went to the fatal spot where she put an end to herself with her own shawl. She was a handsome girl about 18 years of age.
