SIR,—Having seen a paragraph in one of the Limerick Papers, stating, with other matters, that a few days back the *Tree of Liberty* had been planted in this town, and suffered to continue erected for several days, as a proof of intemperance and disaffection—thus charging, not only the lower order with disaffection, but the Magistrates and respectable inhabitants with countenancing this supposed spirit of rebellion.—I beg leave to state the plain fact, which will be the best refutation: On the eve of May-day, the young men of the neighbourhood, as is usual, assembled and cut a May-Pole, which they, on the following day, put up, and continued dancing round—an ancient custom, practised not only here, but, I believe, in most of the country towns in the kingdom. It is true this Bush was decorated, not with insignia of treason, but with the name of their beloved representative, Mr. Mathew.—This indeed, I apprehend, gave offence to some, whose good understandings ought to make allowances for the ferment of a contested election.—The riot, alluded to, was in consequence of an arrest for debt; and as the parties are now in the hands of the law, I shall make no remark on their conduct.

The above is from a Correspondent, on whose veracity we can rely—whence our readers will observe these alarms reduced within the narrow compass of a mere local nature.—We shall ever deprecate a tendency to disorder, be its originating principle whence it may. But when we perceive circumstances, for which the common law of the land is sufficiently potent, magnified into insurrection, and the May-boys Bush transfigured into a Tree of Liberty, we feel ourselves called on, by that duty, which our country will ever find us ready to discharge—to vindicate its character, and prevent that irritability which such alarms may lead to.—It little imports, whether character, public or private, be taken away by design or ignorance, the evil is the same: were it not for this reflection, we may consign the subject of these observations to oblivion—but when prejudice already holds the Mirror, through which our every action is to be observed, and by which our personal liberties may be endangered—are we to become the executioners of our own peace and fame, and waft to the shores of our sister island, the gloomy tidings of insurrection?—When the unfortunate decision of the Continent shuts out the manufactures of Britain from its consumption, is England to learn that we have planted the Tree of Liberty, or some such Standard!—can it be then supposed that the English capitalist will risque his property in a country disaffected and disturbed—thus the ruin of our Trade is to follow the ruin of our Character.

Such must be the effects of a bad name: it not only tends to the immediate ruin of our Country, but by sheaking the Empire at large, we aid the common enemy, whose wily views are now exclusively directed to us—we possess advantages that have hitherto saved us from the general wreck. Let us improve them, and not by a narrow policy show a divided interest. No
