arrangement, which induced the Lord Chief Justice
 Downes to direct a Jury to be impanelled; and
 they were sworn to try whether the prisoner was
 insane by the visitation of God, or not. Doctor
 Fitzgerald, the inspector of the prison, the gaoler
 and turnkey, were examined. It appeared from
 their evidence, that the prisoner had conducted
 himself with great propriety from the time of his
 committal until about ten days previous to the as-
 sises, when there was a report in the prison, that
 Meany was mad, upon which he was examined by
 the physicians, who found his clothes torn, and
 his dress otherwise disordered—he talks in a light,
 simple manner, very different from his ordinary
 practice, but all this seemed to be the result of
 artifice, and not of any disease of the mind.—
 After a very humane and perspicuous charge, the
 Jury found, "that he was not insane."

Another Jury was then sworn, and the priso-
 ner was tried for a burglary and robbery, in the
 dwelling-house of Patrick Higgins, on the night
 of the 11th of January, 1806. The facts were
 fully proved by the prosecutor, (Higgins), who
 was much cut and abused by the party, for the
 resistance he gave them. The prisoner made no
 defence and was found guilty.

Laurence Higgins was indicted for a rape upon
 Mary Waters, who deposed to the outrage, and
 that she cried out as loud as she could,—but upon
 her cross-examination by Mr. M'Nally, she ad-
 mitted, she had cried out before, nine months
 after an intercourse with the prisoner by whom
 she had a child 6 months old at the time of the
 alledged offence, he was acquitted.
