Governor of Monte Video.—The Governor of Monte Video, and suite, have arrived at Cove, Cork, on board the Elizabeth transport on their way to England. The Elizabeth sailed from Monte Video in company with 9 sail of transports, two prizes and three merchantmen, under convoy of his Majesty's ships Lancaster and Howe. She was 13 weeks on her passage.—No more was known at Monte Video of Gen. Crawford's expedition, than their arrival at the Cape of Good Hope. The capture of Buenos Ayres is not mentioned.

The American schooner Eliza and Katty, which arrived at Cork on Wednesday last, left Cadiz on the 8th inst. at which time Lord Colbington was cruising off that port with nine sail of the line.—There were lying in the harbour of Cadiz, on the 8th, 11 Spanish line of battle ships, and one frigate, apparently ready for sea.

M'Alister, for a felony, acquitted for want of prosecution, to give security.—Laurence Leary and Margaret Leary, for felony, acquitted for want of prosecution: to be discharged on giving bail.—Wm. Houlton, for the murder of Pat. M'Gan, acquitted, but found guilty of manslaughter, to be burned on the hand, and imprisoned 12 months.—Patrick Shaughnessy, acquitted of the murder of Catherine Sullivan: guilty of a riot and assault.—Patrick Driscoll, for the murder of Mr. David O'Brien; not guilty.—Michael Maher and John Richardson, for assembling by night, and firing shots into the house of Mr. Carmody, at Ashfort; acquitted—but ordered each to find securities for 200*l.*

It was intended to John O'Day, a soldier, 40 years of age, a weaver, charged on the oath with feloniously administering a certain oath, purporting to be the said Patrick Higgins, and a certain unlawful conspiracy, made between the said Higgins, and divers other persons above alluded to, as follows, (all soldiers being of the foot), were to be tried for the oath:—John Quin, pump-maker, labourer, Wm. Sullivan, shoemaker, James Hammill, shoemaker, John Donnelly, ditto, Chas. Conner, butcher, M. Delaney, weaver, Pat. Higgins, labourer, Wm. Kennedy, ditto, Daniel Eagan, ditto, John S. Doran, ditto, D. Gollagher, do. ditto, L. O'Donnell, ditto, T. Conroy, ditto, T. Jordan, do. Standing all the necessary judicial proceedings against the conspirators, an order was issued from London yesterday morning, to remove them from the custody of the sheriff, and to be entered into recognizance for foreign service, for life. Not one of them were last night marched from the military escort to the New Garrison, to remain prisoners.

COMMENCEMENT OF HOSTILITIES WITH AMERICA.

The Press to communicate the arrival of the admiral, of dispatches from Admiral Boscawen commanding the British squadron on the American coast, announcing an Action to be fought off New York, between his ship Leopard, and the American frigate, in which the latter, having been killed, and several wounded, was compelled to strike her colours and has been carried to the American port. We are uninformed as to the circumstances of this action, or whether they were such as to result from the amicable adjustment of the affair being amicably adjusted, however, to think, from the result which have reached us, that this action is the result of premeditated hostility on the part of America, and that it may be considered as the commencement of the American War.—Under this impression, we are to see the Navy and the Country on the one hand, and we have been more injured by the fraudulence of America than we can be by her hostility;—by giving cover and protection to the privateers of France, she has rendered our commerce impotent, and deprived us of the only resource we possessed of inclining the enemy to making him feel the pressure of the war.

DUBLIN—JULY 29.

The 11th Light Dragoons, which arrived in this city from England. Yesterday last, about two o'clock in the afternoon, a grazier was stopped in the Phoenix-street, a single footpad, and robbed of 700*l.* and fled in town that morning. The fellow was afterwards pursued by a number of people, and was several times seen, at length effected his escape.
