On Wednesday evening last, a very fine boy of
 14 years of age, of the name of Cahill, was mi-
 raculously saved on the North Strand by James
 Herrit, who intrepidly brought him above water
 at the moment death hovered round him.

On Sunday last, died in Dublin, where she
 went for the benefit of medical aid, Mrs. Ken-
 nedy, wife of John Kennedy, of this city, Esq.

 near the city by the merchants, gentlemen of rank
 with their equipages, and an immense number of
 the citizens, who attended the funeral to St. John's
 church where her body was interred—the gloomy
 appearance of the streets as it past along, (the
 shops being all shut) indicated the feelings of the
 public in her lamented death.

Vaccination.—In the report of the Royal Col-
 lege of Physicians, it is stated, that in the natural
 small-pox one out of six die—by the inoculated
 small-pox, about one in 300; whereas, out of
 164,381 persons, who had been vaccinated, the
 deaths amounted to only three, which is in the
 proportion of one in 54,160!

English Monthly Report for July.

The wheat harvest has commenced on many of the high
 soils, in the home district, and also in Norfolk, and parts of
 the Isle of Thanet in Kent: except on cold wet lands, the
 produce is expected to prove abundant, as the ear was never
 remembered to be better set in the principal corn countries.—
 The pease have suffered much from the drought, and the Ken-
 tish and Essex beans have been materially injured by the col-
 lier, from the same cause. Oats, as a general crop, will be
 found defective; the few countries though improved, will fall
 very short of their usual produce. Rape and mustard seed
 do not rise well. Potatoes never afforded a finer prospect of
 a general crop. The principal turnip countries, particularly
 Norfolk, have very unequal plants; those early sown are pro-
 mising but the latter ones have been much taken off by the
 fly. The hop plantations have been so materially injured by
 the dry weather in Kent, Sussex, and the Shires, that the pro-
 duce of the year is not laid at more than half a crop. The
 hay has been generally got in well, but has not proved so
 abundant as was expected in many districts. The grass land
 are short of feed, except on cool bottoms, for want of rain.
 The meat-markets have held up their prices for prime beef—
 but mutton and lamb have found a considerable reduction in
 Smithfield. The fairs of the central counties have been abun-
 dantly supplied with cattle, particularly large importation
 of oxen from Ireland. Store sheep find a dull sale, and so
 do hogs. The wool market has experienced a small declen-
 sion from last months.
