farmer, near the Dublin road, about 4 miles from this town, and robbed it of his arms, consisting of two guns and a blunderbuss. One of the boys had under his coat, on coming to the place, a blunderbuss and a pistol, and the other a blunderbuss and a bayonet. After getting Barnes's arms, they danced a jig in the yard, and were perceived by several persons on their return from mass, to join three men at the foot of Ballynockin wood, where they fired several shots. They are supposed to be part of the same gang that lately took arms from Mr. Joseph O'Daniel's dairyman, at Ballyvoreen, between this town and Carrick.

On Monday last, in the open day time, three several murders took place in the neighbourhood of Fethard. The circumstances were as follows: After the cutting of a field of rape, near St. Johns-town, four of the party who had been engaged in it, and had got somewhat inebriated, proceeded to the house of one Delzny, at Knockinglass, against whom they harboured a previous malice.

The party consisted of a man of the name of Meahan, who was the ringleader, two persons of the name of Dwyer, and one Farrel. Arriving at the house, which Delany, on their approach, had shut, they called to him to come out—which, on the assurance of safety, from one of the Dwyers, he at length did, armed with a slane.— They immediately fell upon him, and put him to death, with the most savage brutality. His wife, by whom he has left six or seven children, in endeavouring to save him, was much mangled by several wounds on the head and breast. After the murder the villains retreated and stopped for a short while at an house not far from the place, in order to wash the wounds of one of them whom Delany, in his own defence, had cut with the slane. In the mean time, the outcry of the murder run thro' Delany's friends, of whom a party immediately pursued the murderers, and came up with them on the lands of Cloubrogan, when they instantly dispatched two of them, Meehan, the principal, and one of the Dwyer's; the other two for the present escaped. The woman's life, we are glad to hear, is not in danger, and she is removed to a place of safety.

The following convictions have taken place since our assizes commenced, viz.

John Kelly, found guilty of the murder of Jn. Tynan, at Templemore, on the 4th of October, 1806—to be hanged on Friday the 31st ult. but was respited to Monday the 10th of Aug. inst.

John Connell, for having, with others, riotously assembled, and assaulted Joseph Cross, to be confined 12 months, and fined 50*l*.

Luke Brennan, found guilty of an assault on James Mara.

Patrick Mooney, tried for the murder of John Donnell, of Knockgraffen, found guilty of manslaughter.

John White, found guilty of felony to the value of 4*s*. 11*d*. sentenced to transportation for life.—Patrick Hally, found guilty of stealing a cow, value 4*l*. the property of Maurice Foran and Michael Nolan, (recommended by the Grand Jury) to be transported for seven years.

#### COUNTY DOWN ASSIZES.

July 29.—Joseph Stinson indicted for stealing oats, the property Esther Beody, at Derrahoy. —Guilty.

Christopher Stinson indicted for receiving same oats, knowing them to be stolen—not guilty, but ordered to find security for his good behaviour.

Henry Mahaffy, indicted for stealing goods the property of Wm. Duncan—acquitted. Also for receiving same goods, knowing them to be stolen. Acquitted.

Pat. Magin indicted for stealing sundry goods, out of the house of the Rev. George Hamilton; no prosecution—acquitted; but ordered to find security for his good behaviour.

John Thompson, indicted for stealing a great

The defendant persuaded him to sell off his furniture and stock—he then removed to an obscure inn, where he had lived several weeks in continued intoxication, and from thence he removed to Dublin, attended by the Defendant, who pretending court- ship to the eldest daughter seduced her, while the second was married to a menial servant. In Dec. 1792, the deed of rule was executed, and in ten days after the vender died.

The witnesses for the defendant, on the contrary, represented the Vender as a shrewd man, expert in making bargains, executing leases, &c. That he was a wit, told a humorous story, was a mimic, and a humbugger. That the sale in question was deliberate and long determined, and that his family, and particularly the Plaintiff, had acted upon the rule, as valid, and received part of the purchase money. The Jury found for the Defendant.
