Last Thursday, James Earaght, servant to Mr. Condon, of Scart, in this county going to shoot crows, unfortunately shot himself thro' the body, and expired same night.

Last Monday night a young man engaged in an affray near the Mail-coach Office in Cork, sus- tained a dreadful fracture of his skull; he was conveyed to the North Infirmary in that city, and trepanned, with little hopes of recovery.

The Assizes for the City of Cork has terminated, and proved what is termed a maiden assizes, no capital conviction having taken place.—The bu- siness of the County closed on Monday. The following convictions took place: Thomas Conner, manslaughter, to be burned in the hand, impris- oned ten days, and to give security for his future good behaviour.—James Condon, burglary and robbery, to be hanged the 14th September next.

Richard Gallivan, robbery, to be imprisoned 3 months: Denis Hurley, manslaughter, to be burned in the hand, imprisoned 6 months, and to give security for his future good behaviour.

Friday last, John Downes, Esq. Surveyor of Excise, on his arrival from the county Galway, seized in Ennis, a quantity of smuggled brandy, which he lodged in his Majesty's store.

Extract of a letter from Castlebar.

"The trial of the soldiers of the Royal Long- ford regiment of Militia, commanded by the Earl of Granard, has terminated as justice had a right to expect, in spite of the partiality and malevo- lence which had misrepresented this unlucky affair to the public.

"It appeared in evidence that the nineteen men of that regiment, who had been charged on the riot at Ballinrobe, and committed for trial to pri- son, had received every insult and provocation from the party of the 5th Dragoon Guards, and particularly from the two men who were unfortu- nately killed in the affray, and from the many favourable circumstances that appeared in the tes- timony of the witnesses for the prosecution, (par- ticularly an officer of the 5th Dragoon Guards) of the outrages and ungovernable disposition of the other party, the prisoners found it unnecessary to enter into any vindication of themselves, and the Jury therefore very soon brought in their verdict —"Fifteen guilty of manslaughter in their own defence," and were strongly recommended by their
