**NOTICE** is hereby given, that by an Act of the present Session (47 Geo. III. session 2, ch. 19) the trades of a Rectifier and Compounder of Spirits will be separated from and after the 29th September 1807; and this Act directs, that no Person licensed to Rectify, shall at the same time be licensed to Compound Spirits; and that no Person licensed to Compound, shall at the same time be licensed to Rectify Spirits, other than such as such Person shall Compound; but that said Licenses shall be separate and distinct, upon each of which a duty of ten shillings British currency for each gallon of the Still's content is to be paid; and that no license shall be granted for any Still for Rectifying, the body whereof, without the head or other appendage thereto, shall not be capable of containing 80 gallons at least, and which shall be capable of containing 200 gallons; nor for any Still for Compounding, the body whereof, without the head or other appendage thereto, shall not be capable of containing 60 gallons at the least, and which shall be capable of containing 100 gallons; and the said Act repeals, from said 29th Sept. so much of the 38th Geo. III. ch. 52, as makes to Rectifiers and Compounders certain allowances in respect of increase by water, sugar, syrup, or fruit; and said Act ch. 19, gives a reduced allowance of 20 per cent. but confines same to Compounders only.

**NOTICE** is hereby given, that by an Act passed in the present Session (47 Geo. III. session 2, chap. 17) the Commissioners of Inland Excise and Taxes in Ireland will, from and after the 29th September, 1807, be authorized to grant Licences for Stills, the body whereof, without the head, or any other appendage, shall be capable of containing less than 500 gallons and not less than 200 gallons, in any place not being within five miles of a distillery, wherein a Still of 500 gallons content or upwards shall at the same time be licenced to be kept; and no Person to be licenced to keep a Still of 500 gallons or upwards, and a Still under 500 gallons at the same time; but if the Commissioners shall grant a licence for a Still of 500 gallons content or upwards, in any place within five miles of a Distillery where one or more Still or Stills under 500 shall be licenced, such last mentioned Still may be continued to be kept at such place, and the Licence for the same may be renewed from the 29th September next following the period at which such Still of 500 gallons content or upwards shall be actually set at work, to the Person or Persons licenced to keep the same, or to his, her, or their heirs, executors, or administrators.
