For your petitioners are strongly impressed rith the conviction, that the continuance of the lisqualifying laws is not only incompatible with he freedom and happiness of the great body of he Irish people, and detrimental to the resources f the State; but as it is calculated to damp the rdour and divert, the attention of the nation to artial, interests and party dissentions from meaners of general security, may eventually prove purious to the strength and stability of the impire.

Your petitioners with a deep sense of gratiide, acknowledge, that they are indebted to the isdom and liberality of the Parliament of Irend and to the paternal interposition of his Masty, for the removal of many of the disabilities id incapacities under which they laboured; and ney refer, with confidence in the justice of their iuse, to the solemn and memorable declaration f the Irish Legislature. " That from the unirm and peaceable behaviour of the Roman Caiolics of Ireland for a long series of years, it opeared reasonable and expedient to relax the sabilities and incapacities under which they laour, and that it must tend not only to the culration and improvement of this kingdom, but the prosperity and strength of all his Majesty's minions, that his Majesty's subjects of all deminations should enjoy the blessings of a free institution, and should be bound to each other mutual interest, and mutual affection."

And your petitioners most solemnly declare, at they do not seek or wish in any way to ince or encroach upon the rights, privileges, possions, or revenues, appertaining to the Bishops I Clergy of the Protestant religion as by law ablished, or to the Churches committed to their arge, or to any of them; the extent of their mble supplication being, that they may be goned by the same laws, and rendered capable of same civil offices, franchises, rewards, and hours, as their fellow-subjects of every other reous denomination.

May it therefore please this Honourable House take into its consideration the Statutes, penal I restrictive, now affecting the Catholics of land, and to admit them to the full enjoyment those privileges which every Briton regards as best inheritance, and which your petitioners at humbly presume to seek, as the brethren of glishmen, and co-heirs of the Constitution.

And your petitioners will ever pray, &c.
