

For your petitioners are strongly impressed with the conviction, that the continuance of the disqualifying laws is not only incompatible with the freedom and happiness of the great body of the Irish people, and detrimental to the resources of the State; but as it is calculated to damp the ardour and divert the attention of the nation to partial interests and party-dissensions from measures of general security, may eventually prove injurious to the strength and stability of the Empire.

Your petitioners with a deep sense of gratitude, acknowledge, that they are indebted to the wisdom and liberality of the Parliament of Ireland and to the paternal interposition of his Majesty, for the removal of many of the disabilities and incapacities under which they laboured; and they refer, with confidence in the justice of their cause, to the solemn and memorable declaration of the Irish Legislature. "That from the uniform and peaceable behaviour of the Roman Catholics of Ireland for a long series of years, it appeared reasonable and expedient to relax the disabilities and incapacities under which they labour, and that it must tend not only to the cultivation and improvement of this kingdom, but to the prosperity and strength of all his Majesty's dominions, that his Majesty's subjects of all denominations should enjoy the blessings of a free constitution, and should be bound to each other in mutual interest, and mutual affection."

And your petitioners most solemnly declare, that they do not seek or wish in any way to interfere or encroach upon the rights, privileges, possessions, or revenues, appertaining to the Bishops and Clergy of the Protestant religion as by law established, or to the Churches committed to their charge, or to any of them; the extent of their humble supplication being, that they may be governed by the same laws, and rendered capable of the same civil offices, franchises, rewards, and honours, as their fellow-subjects of every other religious denomination.

May it therefore please this Honourable House take into its consideration the Statutes, penal and restrictive, now affecting the Catholics of Ireland, and to admit them to the full enjoyment of those privileges which every Briton regards as his best inheritance, and which your petitioners most humbly presume to seek, as the brethren of the Britishmen, and co-heirs of the Constitution.

And your petitioners will ever pray, &c.
