same place, the Lord Bishop and the other gentlemen were lately robbed on their way from Mount Shannon—Mr. Kearney seemed to have an immediate presentiment of the circumstance, as he had only just suggested to Mr. Long the necessity there was for getting on quickly, when the ruffians rushed out, and firing a volley, one of their shots took effect in Mr. Kearney's left arm, on which his horse got restive and threw him, Mr. Long happened to escape—we are sorry to find Mr. K.'s wounded arm was broken in the fall—the villains seemed sorry on observing his situation—a watch and some small change were the only spoil this murderous gang had to boast of, after attempting the life of a valuable member of society—violating the injured laws of their country, and putting a halter about their own necks.—We again repeat there never was a greater necessity for an active police—rewards, it appears, are not sufficiently adequate—private measures—a general search in the neighbourhood—and within a few miles around, are what this second daring outrage instantly requires. Satisfied we are that these villains are lurking some where convenient, and that several of the lower order must know it—the magistrates are therefore called on to exercise the duties they had undertaken, and which they are bound to do—and not by a criminal apathy evince an indifference to the lives and safety of every gentleman, whom either business or inclination may induce to ride out.

We are glad to find Mr. Kearney is somewhat better this day, (tho' the ball is not yet extracted) as, from his general character, his situation yesterday created a considerable degree of public feeling.

Last Sunday Lieutenant-General Floyd, arrived in Cork to assume the command of that district.

Tuesday morning, the American ship Romeo, arrived at Cork harbour in 17 days from Cadiz.—The master reports that the day before he sailed, he was informed by an English merchant at Cadiz, that advices had been there received of the recapture of Buenos Ayres by the British forces.

We understand that a dispute occurred on Monday last, in Killarney, between two of the Miners working at Ross-Island, and terminated in a boxing match, in which, after a few blows, one of them was killed.

A rustic feud of some standing lately led to a general battle between the parties near Lisscarroll, in the vicinity of Charleville, in which some lives were lost. One of the sufferers was put to death under circumstances of brutal ferocity. An inquest was held upon the body, and a verdict of wilful murder against certain persons returned to Mr. Foot, the coroner.

The Yeomanry in this country are exempt from the approaching general ballot: if a better reason did not exist, this circumstance ought to give this part of our national force no inconsiderable augmentation. Government, we understand, intend requiring certified returns of the periods when the members of the Yeomanry entered their respective Corps—as it is intended not to extend the exemption from the ballot to those who have not joined a reasonable time before the commencement of it.
