American Newspapers, of so late a date as the  
4th August, have just been received at our Office.  
They are the latest arrived in Europe. Their con-  
tents are as follows:

The two British Officers, and three Seamen taken  
at Lynnhaven-bay, have been returned by order  
of the President, to the ships to which they  
belonged. The People of America are all anima-  
ted with one spirit. The answer of the President,  
is a proof that the Government possesses the same  
desire for asserting their independence. When  
waited upon by two respectable Gentlemen, con-  
cerning the means of waging hostility with any  
prospect of success, the answer was, "*France  
has Ships and we have Seamen.*" The British are  
giving up the American seamen. Sir Thos. Hardy,  
in the Triumph, gave up a black man belonging  
to Baltimore, and said there were eight more  
would be given up on proper application. Mr.  
Blennerhasset has been arrested at Lexington  
(Ker) for High Treason, and committed to the  
Jail of Richmond, in Virginia. The Americans  
complain of the capture of 18 of their vessels  
in the Mediterranean, by the British, from the

**TRALLEE, Sept. 4.**—It is only for the purpose of refuting  
the extravagant reports which have been circulated here, and

raging amongst us in all its virulence. Having mentioned the  
extent of the mortality occasioned by the Plague, it will be  
thought unnecessary for us to adduce other proofs of the in-  
correctness of this wicked or unthinking fabrication. For  
the purpose of learning whence the report originated, we  
have applied for information to the sources from which it  
may be best obtained, and have discovered that it arose from  
the proper precautions which were observed in pretending,  
as much as possible, all access to the apartment of the deceas-  
ed, in fumigating their rooms and consuming their clothes;  
for it certainly appears that the fever of which they died was  
attended with symptoms of a very uncommon, and conse-  
quently of an alarming nature. The infection was commu-
