They have also resolved, that a reward of 50 guineas be given to any person or persons who by private, or one hundred guineas to any who by public information, shall be the means of prosecuting to conviction any offender or offenders against said Act; and that protection, and if necessary, subsistence in any part of Ireland, be solicited from Government, for such person, as otherwise, might be deterred by local fears from furnishing any material information.

Waterford, Sept. 8.—On Tuesday evening last a most savage murder was perpetrated in the neighbourhood of Market-hill, near Fethard, in the county Tipperary. A man named Landers, accompanied by his brother and another man, on their return from a field where they had been reaping, were attacked by fourteen men, who murdered Landers on the spot. His brother and the other man made their escape in the beginning of the attack, unhurt: but one of them, in his flight, left a great coat after him, and on coming to look for it in the morning, discovered the body of the unfortunate sufferer. No cause whatever has been assigned for this outrageous act.—*W. Chron.*

On Monday, in Jail-street, Ennis, Mr. John Cleary, sadler. Near Rosetta, in Egypt, last April, of the wounds he had received, Andrew Pick, Esq. captain in the 35th regt. of foot, son to Sir Vesian Pick, and nephew to the Rev. John Pick, of Johnstown, in the county of Kilkenny.—He was a young man of piety and virtue, a most excellent officer, and an invaluable friend.—He died, with his whole company, except three, whilst nobly leading them to the charge against a large Turkish army, principally cavalry; and fell, (overpowered by numbers) in the cause of his King and Country.
