 in this manner for some time, when they retired to Raheny;
 the guns having been previously dispatched to take up a position
 in Mr. Dick's grounds, at the opposite side of the town—
 the sharp-shooters lining the hedges and garden-wall. This
 most commanding situation became an highly interesting scene,
 when the cannon opened their fire on the head of the ap-
 proaching column, and the sharp-shooters from under cover, at
 various points, commenced their galling fire.

The columns of attack were equally well conducted under
 Captains Exshaw, Latouche, Croker, and Stamer; that consist-
 ing of the Stephens-Green and Loyal Dublin Rangers, under
 the command of Captain Ekshaw had an opportunity of
 displaying its skill at the town of Raheny, by forcing so strong
 a position; before the column advanced to the attack, two
 guns were brought up to dislodge those of the enemy, and at
 the same time the sharp-shooters advanced under cover of a
 wall, and commenced a brisk fire on those of the enemy.

The column consisting of the Barrack and Loyal Dublin
 Infantry were equally well-conducted in their attacks on the
 main body of the enemy wherever they made a stand, and
 were judicious in bringing up a gun to an advantageous situa-
 tion in a field of Lord Annesley's to dislodge the enemy's pic-
 quet placed at the Church.

The Artillery under the command of Captains Prentice and
 Coleman, and Lieutenant Wrightson, were well served, and
 brought up promptly.

The plan was so happily executed that the retiring parties
 arrived on the plain of Coolock precisely at the same time,
 where they formed a line on the plain with their right strongly
 posted on some old buildings; the manœuvres here were accu-
 rately executed and highly interesting, to which the sharp-
 shooters considerably contributed as well as the playing of the
 artillery on the distant column as it approached, who on their
 part instead of making a direct attack, made a judicious move-
 ment to the enemy's left, under cover of the hill, and their
 own skirmishers who masked the manœuvre by extending
 along the rising ground in front of the enemy, by which they
 were obliged to throw back their left, to prevent its being
 turned.—The advancing party on gaining its position, wheeled
 into line and advanced by Echellon of companies to within
 musquet shot, when a general engagement took place, both
 parties commencing by a regularly and steady fire of platoons,
 after which a most heavy and well kept up independent fire
 commenced, supported by six pieces of artillery playing the
 whole time.

On the drums and bugles sounding, the firing ceased, both
 bodies advanced in line—halted—opened ranks, and presented
 arms to each other, the bands playing 'God Save the King.'

The day was uncommonly favourable, and the whole passed
 off, not only to the admiration of the immense concourse of
 spectators, but also to the entire approbation of many discrim-
 inating officers of high distinction.

We should not close this detail without stating how much
 the corps were indebted to Captain Carleton and his troop for
 their exertions in keeping the lines and roads clear.

In consequence of the arrival of the *London Gazette Extraordinary*, at our office, last night, which is given in the preceding columns, we are obliged to omit several local articles.

About nine o'clock on Monday night last, the town of Ennis was thrown into much confusion by the alarming cry of Fire! Fire! at which time the flames were seen to issue with considerable rapidity from the roof of a house that fronts the street and forms the corner of Hunt's-lane, and uniting with that side of Church-street, excited the most serious and dreadful apprehensions for the safety of a principal part of the town; but providentially was soon got under, thro' the humane exertions of the officers and privates of the 31st regiment, assisted by the inhabitants, and the artificers now engaged under Mr. Lillis, in the repairs of the Court-house.

The inhabitants of Limerick were often indebted to the exertions of Francis Arthur, esq. for the improvement of Newtown—but never more so than in the erection of one of the best meat markets in any city of the united kingdom. Its central situation, between the old and new city, attracts the public notice, whilst the comforts of the victuallers are attended to in the surrounding houses, built for their accommodation by Mr. Arthur. We hear that most of the stalls are already engaged, and that it will open on Saturday the 25th inst. with a great display of the best beef, mutton, veal &c. in the kingdom.
