

JAMAICA FLEET.

The John Bull, Capt. Lea, from Jamaica, arrived at Liverpool on the 22d instant:—she sailed from Kingston on the 24th July, and from Negril Bay, on the 1st August, with the fleet for Great Britain, &c. and parted from them on the 31st August on the Banks of Newfoundland; and for eleven days after the wind was at N. E. and S. E. The Polly, Captain Parker, parted at the same time, but Captain Lea lost sight of her the same night. The John Bull was chased on the 20th instant, off Tory island by a lugger, which she supposes to be a privateer: while making his escape he spoke the brig Hero, from Limerick for Greenock, to whom he gave information that the sail in sight was a privateer, and soon afterwards saw the lugger board her.

We are sorry to hear, that when the last Messenger came off, Lord Cathcart's health was indifferent, and that Sir David Baird's wound had been productive of more serious consequence than at first was apprehended.

The opinion that a rupture will take place between this Country and America gains ground in the city. In what temper of mind Mr. Munro took his departure is not publicly known, but it is pretty generally understood that our Government maintained a dignified tone on some of the points endeavoured to be wrested from this country by threats. On some of these Mr. Monroe is said to have remarked that they had been conceded by the Treaty some time ago to America. The answer was—"True"—and if your Government had ratified that Treaty, his Majesty's present Ministers would have considered themselves bound by the act of their predecessors; but the treaty being returned unratified, has now no more weight than other piece of waste paper.

The question between this country and America may be reduced to a very narrow compass. The Americans contend that they have a right to trade with the French colonies, because France has permitted them during the war. We answer that, in the very nature of things, a war in which they are not a party, cannot confer privileges on them from which they are debarred in time of peace. France does not allow America to trade with her colonies during peace, and allows her to do so during war, because it is of service to France. By the spirit of colonial law, none can trade with the colonies of any country but the mother country—and it follows that every vessel so trading can have no other protection in that trade than what the mother country can afford them.

Parliament is further prorogued to Tuesday, the 10th November next, when it will positively meet for the dispatch of business.
