AT the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 29d of December 1806.—Present the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.—Whereas the time limited by his Majesty's Order in Council of the 25th day of June last, prohibiting the transporting into any parts, out of this kingdom of any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, sheet copper, oakum, or other naval stores, will expire upon the eleventh day of January next: and whereas it is judged expedient for his Majesty's service and the safety of this kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer, his Majesty doth therefore, with the advice of his Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whosever do at any time, for the space of six months, from the said eleventh day of January next, presume to transport into any parts out of this kingdom any pig iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper, or other naval stores, or do ship or lade any pig-iron, bar-iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, oars, oakum, sheet copper or other naval stores on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any parts beyond the seas without leave or permission first being had and obtained from his Majesty or his Privy Council, upon pain of incurring the forfeitures inflicted by an act passed in the thirty-third year of his Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to enable his Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by proclamation or Order of Council;" but it is nevertheless his Majesty's pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend, to any of his Majesty's ships of war, or any other ships or vessels or boats, in the service of his Majesty, or employed or freighted by his Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of his Majesty's navy; nor to prevent any ship or vessel from taking or having on board such quantities of naval stores as may be necessary for the use of such ship or vessel during the course of her intended voyage or by license from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the time being; nor to the exportation of the said several articles to Ireland, or to his Majesty's yards or garrisons, or to his Majesty's colonies or plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to his Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of St. Helena, or to the British settlements or factories
