TRIAL OF MR. AARON BURR.

Richmond, (Virginia,) August 31.—The chief justice delivered the opinion of the court on the motion made by the counsel of colonel Burr, to exclude all other evidence from the consideration of the jury, as irrelevant upon the present indictment; the result of which opinion was, that under the particular circumstances of the case, as detailed in the evidence already given, no further testimony could be relevant. At the request of mr. Hay, (who wished time to consider as to the course which it would be proper for the counsel on the part of the United States to pursue,) the court adjourned until to-morrow.

Burr Not Guilty of Treason.

Sept. 1. Mr. Hay observed, that the opinion delivered to the court on yesterday, had been maturely considered by counsel of the United States, the result of which was, that he had nothing further to offer to the jury, either of evidence or argument.

The jury then retired, and after an absence of 20 minutes returned a verdict in these words— "We, of the jury, find that Aaron Burr is not proved to be guilty under this indictment, by any evidence submitted to us. We therefore find him Not Guilty."

This form of verdict was objected to by colonel Burr, and his counsel, who insisted that it should be in the usual form, simply, not guilty—Mr. Hay contended the jury had a right to find their verdict in this form, &c.—One of the jury observed, that if he were sent out again he should not agree to return a verdict in any other form; and if he were to answer *ereus*, he should use the very same words. The chief justice said, the court could not reject it; because it was a full answer to what was given them in charge.

Col. Burr observed that he should not move for a discharge till to-morrow; and that if any objection should occur to that course it might now be made.

The court adjourned until to-morrow; when the counsel for the United States will determine upon the course to be pursued with respect to Colonel Burr. Previous to the adjournment, however;

Gen. Jonathan Dayton appeared in court to answer the indictments found against him by the grand jury for treason and misdemeanor. He entered into bail in the sum of 10,000 dollars, and mr. Williamson and mr. Martin entered as his sureties in the recognizance.

Mr. Martin was nearly thirteen hours in delivering his argument, on the 28th and 29th Aug.

Clonmel, Oct. 7. Some days ago an inquest was held in this county, on the body of James Conn, a sub-constable, for the apprehension of whose murderers a liberal reward has been offered by Lord Donoughmore. This man was inhumanly butchered on his return from the last fair of Cahir, and his arms taken away. Lord D. attended the inquest, and has been unremitting in his endeavours to bring the perpetrators of this murder to justice. On Monday se'ennight his lordship, attended by an escort of the 11th light dragoons, unexpectedly scoured an extensive district of the country, around Knocklofty. His lordship and the party remained 11 hours that night in search of persons against whom his lordship had information for various offences. Seven persons, charged with murder, and other capital offences, were secured and committed by his lordship to the gaol of Clonmel.— Among these were some farmers of the higher order — Much good has already resulted and
