Yesterday afternoon Captain Gordon, of the sloop, arrived at the Admiralty Office, with dispatches from Lord Collingwood, in the Mediterranean. Captain Gordon was also the bearer of dispatches for Lord Castlereagh and Mr. Brough.

Captain Gordon's dispatches relate to the two operations between the Turks and Russians, and the conduct of the Russians in the Adriatic. The Montenapans have certainly surrendered the islands of Cattaro to the French, to whom every facility, covering, as we understand, their ships of war, the transports conveyed the French troops. The second action between the Russians and the latter wishing to retake Tenedos, the Turkish side was about ten sail of the line.—The action was long and obstinate; but the Russian fleet length defeated with great slaughter. The Turkish fleet, commanded by Beker Bey, the British admiral in command, was taken, and two more of the line were driven on shore the Turks killed them. Beker's ship had 200 men killed and wounded.

The arrival of the Prince of Mecklenburgh, his Majesty's nephew, gave rise yesterday to a variety of surmises and speculations. It was confidently reported that he is charged with the office of proposing terms of peace, as connected with the Treaty of Tilsit and the mediation of Russia.

A new Minister is immediately to be sent out to the United States to replace Mr. Erskine, who is recalled. Mr. Monroe, who has taken his final leave of Government sails for America in the course of the week. He will probably take his passage in the Augusta, which is better calculated for his accommodation than the Revenge.

FROM THE HAMBURG CORRESPONDENTEN, TO THE 25TH SEPTEMBER.

Berlin, Sept. 10. The following is the Order of the Day—the town of Berlin, and the Prussian territories, occupied by the French, not yet being evacuated, until the conditions of the Treaty of Tilsit are fulfilled. Marshal Clark, Governor General, forbids foreign military persons, of whatever rank they may be, to appear in uniform in the city, or to exercise the privilege of

The Proclamation of Prussia for shutting the ports of that Kingdom against Great Britain, is to be found in the last page.—We are not surprised that in the present degraded state of Prussia, she should have no choice of her own; but to act as she may be commanded by her conqueror—French usurpation!
