CHARITY BALL.

At a general meeting of the Governesses of the Protestant Female Orphan School, the 16th of Oct. 1807—It appeared, from the statement of the Treasurers' account, that the balance in hand amounted only to *8l. 18s. 0½d.* a sum totally inadequate to the support of the school, to the 28th day of February next, on which day the subscriptions for the next year will become due: in order to supply the deficiency, the Governesses deem a **PUBLIC BALL** the most eligible mode. About one o'clock on Tuesday last, Edmond Mulcahy, of Nicholas-street, corn-buyer to Mr. White, of this city, merchant, was stabbed with a bayonet in the left side, by the sentinel stationed at the head of pump-lane, which almost instantly deprived him of life—he bore a most excellent character, and has left a wife and five young children to deplore his melancholy and untimely death. The soldier was immediately taken into custody, and an inquest held on the body of the deceased, when, after examining several witnesses, a verdict of "wilful murder" was returned against Daniel Hurley, private in the South Cork Militia.

Last Tuesday night a man of the name of Brown, going on board his boat, which lay near Torrance's Quay, fell into the river, and would have perished but for the immediate assistance of two watchmen.

About one o'clock on Monday last, a fire broke out in the town of Rathkeal, by which four houses were consumed. The very timely assistance of Henry Brown, Esq. assisted by the inhabitants and military, fortunately prevented any further damage.

by motion was carried unanimously. The "usual manner," if it has any meaning, is, that the memory of the civil wars in Ireland, of more than 100 years ago, shall be celebrated, as if honour or felicity could result from reminding the people of Ireland that they once fought against each other; or as if unanimity or cordiality could arise out of putting one party in mind of their triumph, and the other of their defeat. This annual ceremony, the foolish parent of irritation and animosity, was rightly and properly omitted last year, while the Duke of Bedford was in authority; and every real friend to the tranquillity and character of Ireland rejoiced at it; and hoped to see those exasperating mummeries laid at rest for ever.

The enemies of Ireland, those who wish for dissention and animosity, in the place of a cordial and national sentiment, will now have in their turn an opportunity of rejoicing. The unanimity they apprehended, will be at least interrupted; the coalescence of the people which they abhorred will be prevented—one party will have the indulgence of covering a statue with ribbands and the other the mortification of seeing that the insensibility is less regarded than this puerile and contemptible ceremony. For this barren and tasteless pleasure, which disgusts sense, and enrages policy; which has no connection with the past, but to perpetuate its evils; nor with the present, but to make it as bad as the past, the Metropolis of an acute and sensible people, whose concordance in political prejudices is necessary to their common existence, is to be thrown into irritation,—into that silent and bitter disgust which is sometimes more formidable than the loudest and most clamorous discontent. Shall we ever grow wise?

Permits for Hops.—As considerable inconvenience has been experienced by merchants, and others, dealing in hops, occasioned by officers of the customs supposing that permits are necessary in cases of transfer—in order to explain that subject, and prevent such inconvenience in future, we annex the following:

GENERAL ORDER.

Custom-House, Dublin, Sept. 3, 1807.

Sir—The Board finding that it has been the practice for some of the permit-officers to grant permits for hops, and other articles, which do not require a permit for their protection in transfer from one place to another—the Board direct you to give instructions to the permit-officers in your port, not to issue any permits for any article other than those which expressly require them.
