He gave examinations before Mr. Poe, of Harley Park, against his murderers. Verdict—"That he came by his death in consequence of blows which he received on his head from Morgan Torpey, Michael Maher, James Walsh, William Dalton, John Hayes, and Patrick Shiels, aided and assisted by John Torpey, Daniel Torpey, John Maher, and Michael Shonen."

VOLUNTEERS.

We have to state, for the information of Members of Volunteer Corps, the circumstance in which they are placed with regard to the approaching Ballot. Volunteers are liable to be drawn, as well as other individuals, but the ballot will be voided, with respect to them, as long as they remain effective members of these corps; but if persons drawn at any time cease to be effective members, they are immediately liable to be claimed in the Militia. To constitute an effective member, a Volunteer must have exercised eight days in the four months preceding the ballot, or within the eight months preceding, which must be certified by the Commanding-Officer; and it is to be observed, that officers, as well as privates, are to be subject to the same regulation.—Penalty for an individual making a false claim is £. 50, and for a Commanding-Officer making a false certificate 200l.

In consequence of the great storm on Monday night, a boat laden from Dublin for this city, sunk in the Shannon, about two miles above Killaloe—fortunately the hands were saved.

Same night, a man of the name of Lacy, crossing one of the gates near the above place, was blown into the chamber of the canal, and unfortunately perished.

Mr. O'Brien, who was unfortunately killed by falling from his horse some days since, left this town (Ennis) perfectly sober, and the melancholy catastrophe which ensued, is solely attributed to his riding a young and unmanageable horse, which took fright at some object near Edenvale, and having thrown his rider, is supposed to have kicked him when down, as there was a large cut on the forehead of his head.—Ennis Chronicle.
