The grand fleet, in the Baltic, consists of 59 ships, carrying 2200 guns, viz. 30 entirely new ships of the line, with 1588 guns-14 frigates, with 426-6 cutters, with 133-and 19 smaller vessels, with 116 guns. Besides these, there are in the ports of the Baltic 12 old ships of the line. The fleet of gallies, gun-boats, &c. consists of 189 sail, with 705 guns, viz 20 gallies, of 130 guns-25 floating batteries, with 160-48 gun-boats with 162-and 63 other vessels with 163 guns. The fleet in the Black Sea consists of 41 ships, carrying 1225 guns, viz. 12 ships of the line, with 981 guns-4 frigates, with 162-7 brigantines, with 54-and 14 smaller vessels, with 91 guns. There are also 40 gun-boats, with 52 pieces of cannon, and 80 other hoats. The flotilla in the Caspian Sea consists of six vessels, carrying in the whole 70 guns.

Receipt to destroy Rats .- Get some new burnt quicklime, and pound it in a mortar-take also some very dry powdered sugar, and moulder it quite small: loaf sugar would not easily incorporate, and moist or raw sugar would slack the lime. To one part of the sugar, and one part of oatmeal, put two parts of the lime. Mix the whole as completely as possible by squeezing and rubbing them together with the hands, and spread the powder thin, on flat earthen plates, in the way of the Rats. They eat it greedily, and immediately after run for the water, which slacks the lime in their stomach, so that they burst and die. If wa ter be not at hand, a plate with water may be set ocar the mixture.

By the Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland .- A Proclamation.

THEREAS his Majesty's service doth at this time require a speedy supply of Scamen and Scafaring Men, to man his Majesty's Fleet which is now fitting out. We do by his Majesty's Command, direct and require all Civil Magistrates in this part of his Majesty's United Kingdom called Ireland, to use their best endeavours to cause all such Seamen or Seafaring Men, fit for his Majesty's service, as may be met with, to be taken up, and sent on board any of his Majesty's ships or vessels in the Ports, or on the Coast of Ireland, or to any of his Majesty's Sea Officers who may be employed to raise men on shore for his Majesty's Fleet, according as the places where such ships or vessels, or such Sea Officers may be respectively stationed shall be nearest. And for the encouragement of the Persons who shall be entrusted with the care of

said; but we do strictly coroin all such our Captains, Masters, and others, that they do permit no Man to go on board such Ships and Vessels belonging to the States at amity with us, for the purpose of so seizing upon, taking, and bringing away such Persons as aforesaid, for whose discreet and orderly demeanour the said Captains cannot answer-and that they do take especial care that no bunecessry violence be done or offered to any Vessel, or to the remainder of the Crew, from out of which such Persons shall be taken;

And in case of their receiving information of any such Person or Persons being employed, or serving on board of any Ship of War belonging to such Foreign State in amity with us, we do authorize and command our Captains, Masters, and others; commanding our Ships of War, to require of the Captain or Commander of such Foreign Ship of War, that he do forthwith release and discharge such Person or Persons, being our natural-born Subject or Subjects; and if such-release and discharge shall be refused, then to transmit information of such refusal to the Commander in Chief of the Squadron under whose orders such Captain or Commander shall be then serving; which information the said Commander in Chief is hereby strictly directed and enjoined to transmit, with the least possible delay, to our Minister residing at the seat of Government of that State to which the said Ship of War shall belong, or to our Lord High Admiral, or Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty for the time being, in order that we, being apprised of such proceeding, may forthwith direct the necessary steps to be taken for obtaining redress from the Government to which such Foreign Ship of Warshall belong, for the injury done to us by the unwarranted detention of our natural-born Subjects in the Service of a Foreign

And whereas it has further been represented unto us, that divers Mariners and Seafaring Men, our natural-born Subjects, have been induced to accept Letters of Naturalization, or Certificates of Citizenship, from Foreign States, and have been taught to believe that, by such Letters or Certificates, they are discharged from that duty of allegiance which, as our naturalborn Subjects, they owe to us; now we do hereby warn all Mariners, Seafaring Men, and others, our natural-born Subjects, that no such Letters of Naturalization, or Certificates of Gitizenship, do, or can, in any manner, divest our natal ral-born Subjects of the Allegiance, or in any degree alter the duty which they owe to us their lawful Sovereign: But, in consideration of the error into which such Mariner or Seafaring Men as aforesaid may have been led, we do hereby publish and declare our free pardon to all such our Subjects, who, repenting of the delusion under which they have afted, shall immediately, upon knowledge of this our Royal Proclamation, withdraw themselves from Foreign Service, and return to their allegiance to us; and we do declare that such our subjects who shall continue in the service of Foreign States, in disregard and contempt of this our Royal Proclamation, will not only incur our just displeasure, but are liable to be proceeded against for such contempt, and shall be proceeded against accordingly; and we do hereby declare, that if any such Masters of Ships, Prlots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Scafaring Men (being our natural-born Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Algarines, or other Barbary Powers, and carried into slavery, they shall not be reclaimed by us as subjects of Great Britain.

And we do further notify, that all such our subjects as aforesaid, who have voluntarily entered, or shall enter, or vofuntarily continue to serve on board of any ships of war belonging to any Foreign States at enmity with us, are and will be guilty of High Treason: And we do by this our Royal Proclamation declare, that they shall be punished with the utmost severity of the law.

Given at our Court at the Queen's Palace, the 16th day of October, 1807, and in the 47th year of our reign.
