By the Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland.—A Proclamation.

**W**HEREAS his Majesty's service doth at this time require a speedy supply of Seamen and Seafaring Men, to man his Majesty's Fleet which is now fitting out. We do by his Majesty's Command, direct and require all Civil Magistrates in this part of his Majesty's United Kingdom called Ireland, to use their best endeavours to cause all such Seamen or Seafaring Men, fit for his Majesty's service, as may be met with, to be taken up, and sent on board any of his Majesty's ships or vessels in the Ports, or on the Coast of Ireland; or to any of his Majesty's Sea Officers who may be employed to raise men on shore for his Majesty's Fleet, according as the places where such ships or vessels, or such Sea Officers may be respectively stationed shall be nearest. And for the encouragement of the Persons who shall be entrusted with the care of conducting such Seamen and Seafaring Men, they will be paid by the Captain or Commander of such ship or vessel, or Sea Officer employed on shore as aforesaid, respectively, a reward of twenty shillings for each Sea or Seafaring Man, fit for his Majesty's service, and sixpence a mile for every mile they may have travelled, not exceeding twenty miles in the maritime counties, and forty miles in the inland counties. And we do hereby further direct and require the said Civil Magistrates to give all possible countenance and assistance to the Officers of his Majesty's ships and vessels, or to the Sea Officers who may be employed to raise Men on shore, in impressing, or otherwise procuring Men for his Majesty's Fleet.—Given at His Majesty's Castle of Dublin, the 10th day of March, 1803.—By His Excellency's command,

**A PROCLAMATION.**  
RICHMOND, &c.

**W**HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the 47th year of his present Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act for increasing the Militia of Ireland, under certain limitations and restrictions," it is enacted, that within six months after the passing of the said Act, there shall be raised and levied in the several Counties, Counties of Cities, and Counties of Towns respectively, in Ireland, a number of Private Militia Men equal to one half of the quota or establishment specified in an Act made in the Parliament of Ireland, in the 35th year of his present Majesty's Reign, entitled, an Act to explain and amend "an Act passed in the 33d year of the reign of his present Majesty," entitled, "An Act for amending and reducing into one Act of Parliament the laws relating to the Militia in Ireland."

AND Whereas it is in the said first recited Act further enacted, that the men necessary to be raised for the purpose of the said Act should be procured in the several counties, counties of cities, and counties of towns in Ireland, either by ballot in manner directed by said Act, and the several Acts in force in Ireland relating to the Militia, or by the enrolling and receiving volunteers in manner directed by an Act of the 44th year of his present Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act for empowering his Majesty to direct the augmentation of his Militia Forces in Ireland to an extent there in mentioned," as the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor of Ireland,

**A**T the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 22d ber 1806.—Present the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.—Whereas the time limited by the Order in Council of the 25th day of June last, for transporting into any parts, out of this Kingdom, iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, sheet copper, oakum, or other naval stores, will expire upon the day of January next: and whereas it is judged for his Majesty's service and the safety of this Kingdom, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time; his Majesty doth therefore, with the advice of his Majesty's Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and enjoin, that no person or persons whatsoever do at any time, or at any place, within the space of six months, from the said eleventh day of January next, presume to transport into any parts out of this Kingdom, iron, bar iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, sheet copper, or other naval stores, or to land any pig-iron, bar-iron, hemp, pitch, tar, rosin, turpentine, anchors, cables, cordage, masts, yards, bowsprits, sheet copper, or other naval stores, or to load any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same, beyond the seas without leave or permission had and obtained from his Majesty or his Privy Council, upon pain of incurring the forfeitures inflicted by the said Act, and the Statute in that behalf made, passed in the thirty-third year of his Majesty's reign, entitled, "An Act to enable his Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, which have been prohibited by proclamation or Order of Council;" but notwithstanding his Majesty's pleasure, that nothing herebefore done shall extend or be construed to extend, to any of his Majesty's ships of war, or any other ships or vessels in the service of his Majesty, or employed or fitted out for his Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Command of his Majesty's navy; nor to prevent any ship or vessel from taking or having on board such quantities of naval stores as may be necessary for the use of such ship or vessel in the course of her intended voyage or by license from the High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the time being; nor to the exportation of the said several articles to Ireland, or to his Majesty's garrisons, or to his Majesty's colonies or plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to his Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of St. Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies: provided that upon the exportation of any of the said articles for the purposes of trade, or to his Majesty's yards and garrisons, or to his Majesty's colonies or plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the island of Newfoundland, or to his Majesty's forts and settlements on the coast of Africa, or to the island of St. Helena, or to the British settlements or factories in the East Indies, the exporters of such articles do take the oath of the true destination of the same to the place to which they shall be entered outwards, before the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient security, by bond, (except as hereinafter excepted), to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs, to carry the said articles to the places for which they are entered outwards and for the purposes specified, and that other; and such bond shall not be cancelled or discharged until proof be made to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the production, within a time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the bond, of the said articles, or of certificates, in such form or manner as shall be required by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said articles have been all duly landed at the places for which they were entered outwards: but it is his Majesty's pleasure, notwithstanding, that the following articles, viz. bar iron, and tarred rope, tallow or mill grease, tarpaulins, gun covers, pitch, tar, and turpentine, shall be allowed to be exported, upon payment of the proper duties, without bond being entered into by the merchant exporter of the British plantations in the West Indies, or to his Majesty's settlements in South America; provided that the merchant exporter shall first verify upon oath, that the said articles so exported are intended for the use of a particular plantation, or settlement, to be named in the entry outwards, for sale; and that the said plantation or settlement before been furnished with any supply of the said articles during the same season; and provided also that the quantity of the said articles shall, in no case exceed the value of fifty pounds sterling for any given plantation or settlement, whether by one or more shipments within the same year; and the Right Hon. the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord High Admirals of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
