

Europe is leagued to repress the flagitious ambition of France, it is now a league of the Continent through force or inclination against the maritime power and greatness of the British nations. The nature of this sort of conspiracy shows how much the conspiring nations value commerce—the commerce which we are silly told we can do so well without; and as it is now a matter depending whether the commerce of Great Britain shall be abated, and that of France and her vassals set up, it behoves Great Britain to crush, while the conspiracy justifies the measure, every remaining energy of trade, that France or her vassals have left. This can only be done by measures of the utmost vigour—by abandoning all connivance at the carrying on of trade by a treacherous neutral, and boldly circumscribing Europe to its inland dealing, and suspending on the seas the intercourse of the world.—What the precise result of such a procedure may be it is not easy to predict, though it is not perhaps altogether impossible; but one fact is consolatory—that let the result press the United Kingdom ever so much, that pressure will be less severe than if we suffer France to go on upon her present system, and inflict upon us the injuries she meditates.—CORRESPONDENT.

Yesterday and the preceding night the greatest fall of snow known for some years back, was felt here and in the neighbouring counties; on the roads leading to this city, it was at such a height, that the Dublin and Cork Mail Coaches were prevented from travelling, which should have arrived here last night; however, the mails were brought in by express.

The Cork Coach, via Mallow, with some difficulty performed its journey, but did not arrive till a late hour.

The Dublin and Cork Mails were, this morning, dispatched from our Post-Office, by express, as none of the coaches could proceed.

A poor man named Ryan, went out last night in search of a calf, near Broadford, and not since been heard of, apprehensions are entertained that he perished in the snow.

Colonel Lloyd, of Beechmont, near Rathkeale, has been appointed to approve of men to be raised under the late Militia Act, for the Co. of Limerick Royal Regiment, and he is now ready to take charge of them accordingly. The men must be at least 5 feet 4 inches high, and not more than 35 years of age.

John Doneclift, Esq. Lieutenant of the Royal Navy, lately in the impress service in this city, has been appointed, under Capt. O'Brien, to the district of Berterbit, County Galway.

The Commissioners of the Parish of St. Michael, in this city, have appointed John Rich. Harrison, Esq. to be collector of rates and taxes, inspector of nuisances, and superintendent of that parish.

William Marcus Jackson, Esq. has been appointed by the committee of the chamber of commerce, as their agent, for prosecuting the toll and custom gatherers, for extortion.

The Rev. Archdeacon Hill, treasurer to the fever hospital, acknowledges the receipt of thirty guineas from John Kelly, Esq. executor of the late John Flattley, Esq. being a bequest for said charity.

The Expedition in Cork harbour will sail, when the arrangements for its departure are completed, under the command of General Beresford. The order for the disembarkation of the 3d foot, or Buffs, has been countermanded. The destination of the Expedition is believed to be what we before stated. It is not known whether it will have the co-operation of any other force.
