Lieut.-Gen. Aron Villetes, late Governor of Malta, goes out as Lieut.-Governor to Jamaica, to relieve Lieut.-Gen. Sir Eyre Coote.—Sir Eyre Coote, our readers will recollect, was one of the heroes of Egypt. Lieut.-Gen. Villetes, it is said, goes to Jamaica with brevet rank of General in the army.

So great a fall of snow as has taken place within the last eight and forty-hours, perhaps has not been exceeded in this city for a long time.—The roads at some distance from town are nearly impassable. The driver of the Limerick day Coach, which arrived in town on Thursday, presented a most curious appearance : his coat was completely encrusted, from head to foot, in a kind of icy armour, and his face was so severely lacerated, by the severity of the cutting blast, that it was streaming with blood. Although the severity of the weather had partly abated yesterday morning, yet the Coach which left town for Limerick, altho' provided with excellent horses, was so completely locked up in the snow within four miles of this city, that it was not without the greatest difficulty, and the exertions of several of the country people that it was extricated, and proceed on its journey.—*Dublin Correspondent.*

A very laudable example has been lately set in the parish of Delgany, County of Wicklow, to the different parishes.—The Society propose at the commencement of the winter, which we hope, will be followed up, to sell blankets, shoes, flannels, frize, shirts, shifts, and oatmeal, to the honest poor inhabitants, who bring recommendations from their clergyman or some respectable housekeeper, on depositing one fourth of the price, and paying the remainder by weekly instalments of one shilling in the pound, till the whole shall be paid ; but if they pay ready money, they get the article one fourth less than first cost.—So laudable an institution merits universal adoption. Will not the wealthy share a little from their luxuries, to give comfort to the aged, the infirm, the decrepid and the poor ? We shall only say to those,—“ Go, and do thou likewise.”

The letters from Charleston, received, are to the 1st of October, at which time the yellow fever continued to rage with unabated fury. Most of the Europeans lately arrived there had fallen victims to that malignant disease. In Georgia, the same disease raged with equal violence ; and the letters state, that the British Consul at Charleston had refused clean bills of health to vessels bound to England.

Dr. O'Gorman, whose humanity and benevolence were so nobly exercised to the sick and wounded of our army at Buenos Ayres, is a native of the County Clare,—he left this country young, and settled in Spanish America, where he was promoted to the rank of State Physician, the first place in the medical department, and one of high consideration.—A long residence in this sequestered part of the world did not render him unpractised in all the generous qualities of an Irishman—he is in the highest estimation with persons of all ranks in the Spanish part of South America, for his manliness and virtue. When his countrymen wanted the offices of humanity, every man found a friend in Dr. O'Gorman, whose munificence could not be exceeded by any thing but his charity and philanthropy.
